And Be It Further Resolved that the Pension be raised in keeping with the capacity of social economy to increase the output of the necessities of life, the retiring age to decrease as the available supply of younger workers make employment of older workers unnecessary and uneconomical. That the mominion, Provincial and Civic Authorities accept their responsibilities to provide jobs and to this end they should immediately begin construction of modern and good quality low cost homes and if nocessary conscript materials for same, building hospitals and schools, install complete sewerage system in all municipalities, repair and improve all roads. All work to be in conformity with trade union wage

2. Immediate inauguration of the 40 hour week with progressive reduction in hours until the 30 hour week is established with no reduc-

3. Abolition of all non-assential overtime throughout industry.
4. Greatly increased finilities Greatly increased ficilities for vocational and cultural training. Committee recommended this section be adopted.

In dealing with Unemployment Insurance amendments your committee recommend that the Federal Government immediately amend the Unemployment Insurance Act as follows:

(a) The Federal Government to assume full responsibility for all social assistence to unemployed providing extended benefits for those who have exhausted the benefits due them.

Scale of benefits now being paid to be increased consistent with the increase in the cost of living.

Nine day waiting period to be eliminated. Reorganization of present Insurance payment set-up to climinate unemployed having to line up for one or two hours to receive benefits with provision for branch offices.

It is the committee's opinion that these matters should be submitted to the Trades and Labor Congress of Carada for their consideration with the request that they be taken before the Federal Government at the Committee recommended this section be adopted.

unamployed workers for jobs and insurance benefits. (b) All vacancies to be posted in a conspicuous place with details of job. of work required, rates of pay, hours of work and number of men required.

Committee recommended this section be adopted.

Your committee recommend:

That the Federal Government upon demand by any unemployed worker shall return forthwith the total amount of compulsory savings due to the worker from the Government.

(b) Veterans' allowances to be continued until the veteran has a job. Committee recommended this section be adopted.

Your committee further recommend: (a) That this Council reiterate its previous position notifying the Federal Government that the time is long overdue for a Health Insurance Act to cover all Canadian workers. Committee recommended this section be adopted.

Your committee is of the opinion that there is no need to grant financial assistance to the Greater Vancouver Unemployment Organization at this time but we do recommend that this question be reviewed at a future date.

Won motion the committee's report as a whole was adopted."

Legislative Committee, delegate Shearer reported the committee dealt with resolutions submitted from Local 676 Beverage Dispensers Unique and recommended adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved we go on record demanding that a number of additional licenses be issued in the Province of British Columbia and especially in the City of Vancouver where the growth of population has greatly in oreased in recent years, as the Liquor Control Board may deem fit, and that the seating capacity of such licensed premises be limited in numbers, the better to enforce the regulations of the Liquor Act.

And Be It Further Resolved that more Government Liquor stores be opened in suburban shopping areas to fill the same need.

And Be It Further Resolved that the hours of sale in licensed premises revert to pre-war levels, and the quota of malt beverages be removed. "On motion recommendation adopted."

The committee recommend that the Vancouver Trades and Labor Council petition the Dominion and Provincial Governments to ask that the Dominio Government will on petition of the Provincial Government place an embargo on the shipment of malt and alcoholic beverages immediately until such times as we have sufficient for the needs of the citizens of this country. 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The conciliation board had been postponed 5 times in previous months. The Board finally met and recommended in favor of the organization. The company representatives pointed out that the Hudson Bay Co. charter superscdes provincial law. The company have done everything possible to upset certification but this has been upheld. Recently a serious attempt was made to form a company union by representatives of the management approaching the employees and asking them to sign a card requesting an association. The Union called a meeting last Sunday and invited these representatives to state their case. No one appeared. Those interested in forming a company union are holding a meeting Wednesday to elect bargaining representatives. It is our intention to

National Association of Marine Engineers, delegate Slater reported good progress made during the past months. Has received an award covering the O. P. R. and C. N. R. and the Canadian Berge. The award was not large but brings these groups in line with other workers. Have been successful in doing away with the 2 shift watch system in the Yukon. Have had discussions with the Union Co. and are presently awaiting an award from the Regional Board. Have withdrawn threat of strike on this Company in view of the fact the matter is being doalt with by the Board. The Hudson Bay Co. with whom we are negotiating and to date have not met our terms will get no engineers until they meet the terms which have been agreed upon with the White Pass Co.

Machinists 692, delegate Osman reported his organization had signed an agreement with the Sterling Shippards containing a maintenance of membership clause. This agreement will be reopened in 4 months! time. The Local has also taken over Neon Employees Assoc., 98 out of 104 employees coming into Lodge 692. Delegate Osman stated that theso employees came into Lodge 692 for one reason because they can see that the time had arrived when such an association was useless and that only a bonafide union could serve them to advantage.

Bakers Local 468, delegate Kemmis reported his Local is still trying to negotiate with Disher Specialties. Stalling tactics being used and employer seems to have disappeared, and the lawyer does not have the necessary authority to negotiate. Employees have definitely decided that a strike will follow if the agreement is not signed. Naturally we intend to go through conciliation and take all other necessary steps. Have application before the Regional War Labor Board for 44 hour week not 40 hour as stated in the press. Another factory has been organized and now ready to sign the union agreement.

Railway Carmen 58, delegate S. Shearer reported Division 4 have asked for vage increases and have been turned down by the employer. This matter is now before the National War Labor Board.

Hotel and Res. Local 28, delegate May Amsell reported Local 28 thad signed up the Carlton Coffee Bar, 5989 Fraser Ave. Also reported that the Pacific Cafe at New Westminster has signed the agreement. No card in the window as yet. The employer has to be convinced that the card displayed will be to his advantage. Delegate Suggests that union members using this Cafe talk to the girls and convince them that they should all be in the Union. Delegate Ansell also pointed out that there was possibility of trouble in the Trocadero and Rex Cafes. One of the ladies dismissed has buch placed with another employer who has today signed a closed shop agreement. The Maple Leaf Biscuit Company is the employer concerned.

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At this point in accordance with the recommendation of the Executive Mr. H. McGeough, Chief Executive Officer of the Regional War Labor Board was introduced. Mr. LoGeough expressed appreciation at the opportunity to appear pointing out that due to President Showler's suggestion to a meeting of representatives of all Boards in Canada the officers now had authority to make public some of the work that the Boards are doing.

The speaker pointed out that the paramount duty of the War Labor Boards is to stabilize wage structure in Canada in order to maintain stability in prices and prevent increases in the cost of living. In dealing with amendments to the Order, effective February 15th, 1946, the speaker pointed out that the principle change is that of revoking gross injustice and the gross inequality provision and substitute of a comparable provision. The Board may now authorize or direct increase in wage rates which are found to be low.

Regional War Labor Boards from the date of the first " go control order to the end of December 1945 handled 110,265 applientions. Of this number of applications 831% were granted in full, 9.7% were grant in part and only 6.8% were rejected. In reference to the increases granted by Wer Labor Boards in Canada since their institution they have granted increases across Canada to employees amounting to \$222,222,912. a year. In addition cost of living bonuses have been granted amounting to \$43,682,436. making a grand total of \$265,905,348. Seven (7) million people in Canada have had increases as a result of Regional Board decisions. As there are only 4 million working people in Canada this means that many have received more than one increase. A hearty vote of thanks was moved, seconded and carried by the delegates to Mr. McGeough for his very splendid talk on this vital subject.

S. Smylie reported for this committee and recommended that the following delegates be obligated and seated: —J. Rockandel, Canadian Seamon's Union; A. R. Keeton, Railway Carmen Lodge 55; John Staples, Fire Fighters Local 256. "On motion recommendation adopted."

The delegation from the I. W. A. appeared at this time, E. Dalskog, D. Melsmass, H. Pritchett. The President introduced brother Pritchett President of District Council No. 1 who gave a brief outline of the strike situation and a mounced that Justice Sloan had been a mointed to arbitrate on union security. The speaker pointed out that financial sup ort is required and resolutions should be sent to the authorities asking them to take action on clearing up the strike situation. Speaker thanked the delegates for the opportunity of addressing thou and urged support in this strike. It was pointed out that 70 operators had signed agreements to date and that a committee had been established to work with veterans organizations to release lumber for building homes. The speaker was thanked by the president for appearing and urged the delegates to give the matter consideration.

Reports of Officers and Committees (cont'd): Scoretary Gervin reported that arrangements have been made for the Banquet and dance July 12th at 6:30 p.m. Tickets are \$2.50 cach. Dinner expected to end at 8:30 p.m. when I hour's entertainment will be arranged and dancing from 9:30 p.m. to I a.m.

Secretary also reported that the cost of installing a 25 Watt P. A. System with 2 12 inch speakers would be \$274.30. The engineer giving the estimate suggested that in order to get full benefit from such an investment No. I hall should be insulated with proper material. In view of all the circumstances the executive recommend that this matter lay over until action is taken on a new building. Recommendation adopted.

Secretary reported on amendments to labor legislation and new logislation brought down at the last sitting of the Provincial Legislature. Attached to the kinutes is a copy of such legislation.

It was also reported that a meeting had been held with Mr. Harkrider who urged support of labor organizations in the grand spectacle
to be arranged during the Diamond Jubilee Celebration. Mr. Harkrider
pointed out that labor must be represented and given full recognition
for their part in building this great City. Delegates were urged
when this matter was brought before them to do everything they can
to cooperate in making this celebration a success.

Secretary reported that the executive recommend R. McCulloch, Chairman R. K. Gervin, O. Gower, E. Watts, H. Irving, W. Watts, R. Venfesty, J. Eaves, R. Osman for the Labor Day Sports Committee.

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Ooun out tick mil Organizing Committee, delegate Herrett reported a meeting had been held of hairdressers in the City and prospects of forming a local were very good. Those present had signed applications. Further meeting to be held konday, May 27th, 413 Granville Street.

Local of Asbestoes Workers has been organized and an agreement now being negotiated.

Assistance rendered the laundry workers and dry cleaners and a new agreement being negotiated.

Glaziers and Glass workers have been organized, a charter installed and an agreement being negotiated. "On motion reported adopted."

Grievance Committee, George Gee reported committee dealt with a resolution received from the Machinists Local 692 which had been sent

a resolution received from the machinists Local 692 which had been sent to the City Council requesting that body to let a franchise to another company if it be impracticable to operate a municipal transportation system. The resolution arose from the fact that the Machinists considered the present streeter service inadequate and deplorable with no improvement in sight. The committee recommend that the Grievance Committee from this Council take the matter up with the B. C. Electric Railway Company. Delegate Irving rose and objected to the Street Railwayman being represented at the Crievance committee meeting and the article was laid over to be again dealt with by the committee.

Dealing with the request from the Musicians Local 145 to place the State Theatre on the non-patronage list, the Grievance Committee met with representatives of the State Theatre on two occasions. The committee recommend that this matter be left in abeyance in view of the developments proposed by the management of this Theatre. Recommendation adopted.

The Grievance Committee dealt with the matter outstanding between Local 25, Hotel and Res. Employees, and the Trocadero Cafe. Meetings have been held and it is our opinion that an agreement will be reached on the question in dispute during the next week. "On motion the report as a whole was adopted."

Delegate Eaves, reported as representative to the Jubilee Summer Camp Association that a meeting was held Sunday, May 19th in the Y. i. O.A. with 30 delegates present, representing A. F. of L., C. C.L. and C.I.O. as well as other organizations. Brother Pears, Oivic Employees Union, was in the Chair. Four Hundred Fifty-five (455) omildren attended camp last year. Sixty (60) children a week can now be provided for and with more assistance from organizations this can be increased to 100. All delegates were urged to do their utmost to have their organization support the Camp financially. Camp opens first Annday following school closing. "On motion report received.

REPORTS OF UNIONS: - Oarcenters Local 452, delegate Bengough reported one of that Local's members had been refused admission to the Vancouver General Hospital. Asked that the Council investigate this matter with a view to taking it up with the proper authorities.

United Fishermen and Allied Workers Local, reported his local now in process of negotiating agreements. He feels that the local's strike has had an affect on the employers as they are making considerable more progress in less time than ever before.

Machinists Lodge 692, delegate Irving reported that due to the Molders strike many machinists have been locked out. Cannot proceed through a picket line. Expressed the opinion that if this is a molders strike it should not affect only one union but all unions and all shops. Lodge 692 passed a resolution stating they would not handle any oastings declared unfair after the strike was called.

Oarpenters Local 452, delegate Sanderson stated there was a picket line out where he works but before the strike came bout he had contacted I. W. A. representatives. Expressed the opinion that there was no difficulty between the organizations except possibly with one or two newer men.

Brother Showler reported that the Blue Cross Hospital Association had adopted a resolution raising the rates from 60 to 75¢ for single persons and from \$1.50 to \$1.75 for married persons. The reason for this is due to the increase in hospitalization costs.

Hotel and Res. Employees Local 28, delegate May Ansell reported her organization had organized two new houses in the City, the Sun Oafeteria in the Sun Building and the Latin Quarters on Hastings Street. It was moved seconded and carried that the meeting adjourn at 9:50 p.m.

Minutes of the regular meeting held on Tuesday, June 4, 1946.

Meeting opened at 3 o.m. President Showler in the Chair.

Minutes of the previous meeting were adopted as sent out to affiliated locals.

The executive reported on a meeting held the same evening the following delegates being present: -- Showler, Smylie, Stevenson, Shearer, Herrett, Eaves, Gee, Rigby, Gervin.

The executive recommended the adoption of the following resolution: Therefore Be It Resolved that this Council send a strong protest to the Department of Labor at Victoria and request the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada to protest the action of the Federal Department of Labor in appointing one man boards to deal with labor disputes so that in all future disputes a three man board will be appointed.

Recommendation adopted.

CORRESPONDENCE:

(1) Trades and Labor Congress of Canada replying to a resolution forwarded where in it was suggested that a committee of this Council and the Vancouver Labor Council be set up to deal with jurisdictional disputes. President Bengough of the Congress pointed out that under the Constitution it would be impossible for such a joint committee to arrange to give up any jurisdiction of any affiliated organization.

"On motion received and noted."

(2) Local 281 Molders and Foundry Workers informing the Council of the situation regarding their lockout and urging that the Council take what action they can to have C.I.O. pickets removed from the shops where Local 281 is certified as the bargaining representatives. The executive recommend that the letter be left with the President and Secretary to take up with the unions concerned. Recommendation adopted.

(3) Vancouver Labor Council enclosing a resolution urging the Congress to serve warning on the King Government that repressive legis-lation will not be tolerated by the Labor Movement in Canada. For motion resolution endorsed.

(4) Local 167 Maintenance of Way Employees enclosing a resolution whereby the Lodge offers the I.W.A. wholehearted support in their present struggle. "On motion received and noted."

(5) Secretary to minister of Reconstruction informing the Council that representations made for the establishment of a Royal Commission to ensure into the lumbering industry is receiving active attention.

"on motion received and noted."

(6) Calgary Trades and Labor Council enclosing a copy of a letter addressed to the Hon. J. L. Ilsley, protesting against the withdrawal of the subsidy on milk. In view of the feet that this matter has been dealt with by the Council, the executive recommend the communication be received and noted. "On motion recommendation adopted."

(7) Secretary to the Prime Limister replying to a letter requesting the establishment of a Royal Commission to enquire into the marketing of lumber in B. C. and informing the Council that the matter has been referred to the appropriate authorities for attention. "On motion received and noted."

(8) Branch 185, Canadian Legion, expressing appreciation for a donation. "On motion the communication received with appreciation."

Moved, seconded and orried that the executive report as a whole be adopted.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES: --Oredential Committee, delegate Smylie, chairman, reported the committee recommend that the following delegates be obligated and scated: --Dan Sullivan, Plumbers and Steamfitters Local 170; Wm. Logan, H. O. Jorgensen, Typographical Union 226, "On motion committee's recommendation adopted.

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Coun out tick Organizing Committee, delegate Herrett reported that an agreement had now been drawn up for the Glaziers and Glass Forkers. Heetings have been held for hairdressers and good progress being made. Next organization meeting of this group will be held Monday, June 10th, in Hall 304, the organization of hairdressers.

Grievance Committee, deleg to George Gee, chairsan, reported that since the last meeting the Grievance Committee met with representatives of the Machinists Lodge 692 and Division 101 to deal with the resolution presented to May 7th meeting by Lodge 692. The Grievance Committee have gone into this question with the B. O. Electric officials and as they have not had time to discuss the matter with City officials they would offer this report as progress in order to have time to meet the City Council and when a full report is made the Council will be in a position to place the matter b fore the proper authorities. "Upon motion the report adopted."

Committee on the expulsion of Courtney D. Ward, J. Barton reported on January 15th the committee reported recommending this Council write the Cleveland Federation of Labor urging a fair trial in accordance with the laws of the American Federation of Labor for Courtney D. Ward, or any other member or delegate before expulsion. A letter was sent but tabor. Your committee recommend that the report of January 15th be committees recommendation adopted."

Pionic and Sports Day Committee, delegate McGulloch, Chairman, reported meetings have been held and delegate C. Gower of Taxi Drivers 151 has been asked to again take charge of the sports program. Delegate Showler at this time welcomed newer delegates and stressed the fact that a report from their unions would be very welcome also mentioned the necessity of supporting union firms and if in any doubt as to what firms are fair they should call the secretary's office.

REPORTS OF UNIONS: -- Canadian Seamen's Union, delegate Thompson reported on the strike situation on the Great Lakes. Pointed out that for years the Canadian Seamen's Union have attempted to negotiate for an 8 hour day. moughout the war years this matter was held in abeyance in order th t seamen could give their best effort. However, at the last convention the seamen insisted that the 1946 agreement must contain the 8 hour dy. It was long overdue and would assist in keeping in employment seamen returning from the war. Over 99% of the scamen voted in favor of strike action. Many men have been charged under the Canada Shipping act and arrested without warrants. Department of Transport have instituted the 8 hour day and overtime and 2 other firms have followed suit. Seamen here are concerned over the possibility of the strike spreading and are anxious that negotiations which commence on July 1st be commenced and carried through without interuption, but unless government takes action to stop strike breaking every likelihood of the strike spr ding. Thanked the .redes Council and unions for the splendid support to date.

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U. F. A. W. U., Vancouver Local, delegate Rigby reported his union are presently negotiation for an agreement on salmon prices. Progress has been made, but number of questions remain unsettled. An understunding was arrived at where prices were increased on blueback l¢ per pound. Some increase on other varieties. Fishermen are hopeful that the agreements will be signed by the time fishing commences.

Home Service Employees 211, delegate Mrs. Hallock reported her

Home Service Employees 211, delegate Mrs. Hallock reported her union has had cards printed, the name of union and secretary. Asked help from Bakery Salesmen and Milk Salesmen in distributing these cards. Some little difficulty being experienced in contacting people in this line of work as they are moving about from one job to another. Have received good support from the smaller locals and would ask the larger unions to lend support where they can.

Barbers Local 120, delegate Herrett reported his union had signed up a shop at 2123 Commercial Drive.

Bakers Local 468, delegate Bell reported that Discher Specialties is now signed up with the organization after a long period of negotiations.
