Organizing Committee, Secretary reported having attended an Organizing meeting in New Westminster for the purposes of organizing the Laundry Workers in that city. That the meeting had been well attended and that a Charter had been applied for.

REPORTS OF UNIONS: --

Bakers 468, Delegate Humphreys reported that an International representative had been here and that the Bakers had had the biggest meeting since 1920. Reported the organization progressing.

Jewelry Workers 42, Delegate Hawkens reported that they had endorsed May Day.

E.C.Coast Dist. Council, Delegate Peterson reported that they had an organizing campaign. That they were holding meetings and visiting homes. Also holding meetings in camps and in some cases the Camp Operators would not allow their boat to use the Dock. Further that they had definite information of the Prov. Police assisting the Operators in presenting their organizers from holding meetings. In one case the men in the camp protested the interference and had insisted on a meeting and secured an increase of pay as a result.

Domestic Workers 91, Delegate Mrs. Johnston reported a delegation from the Union, along with the C.C.F., appeared before the Relief Committee of the City Council and that they appreciated the assistance of Ald. Pettipiece and Gutteridge and that they had taken up the question of the Relief office sending out Domestic help at low wages and conditions.

Painters 138, Delegate Smith reported organizing campaign having good success and that a number of the Beer parlors are at present employing their members.

Meatcutters Local 95, Delegate Douglas reported that their enquiry had ended and that the report and recommendations of Judge MoIntosh had been favorable to the Union. He found that the Union had been formed to improve conditions of its members and not for any ulterior motive. Also that their conduct had been good and had recommended to the Company that the men be taken back on a basis of 50 in April, 50 in May and 40 in June. Further recommended that the men have a right to belong to any organization of their own chosing, but that the Manager of the Company and the Business Agent of the Union should be transplanted to other fields.

Further reported that the Union had good support from the Trade Unions and the financial support they had received up to date from all sources was in the neighborhood of \$12.000.00.

Engineers 115, Delegate Flynn reported that they had notified the bosses that the 1931 wage scale would go into effect on April 1st, and that this had resulted in \$1.00 per day increases in many cases. Also that the Local went in favor of taking part in the May Day celebrations.

Musicians 145, Delegate Jamieson reported they are donating an orchestra to the Butchers for a dance to be held in the Trianon Ballroom on May 7th and that members can help those on strike from Burns by patronizing the dance. Further that they had been taking up with the Parks Board, the question of employing Union bands instead of the Boys and cheap bands that had been used and that they had had good support from Bros. MacDonald, MacAulay and Pettipiece in their capacity of Park Commissioners.

Milksalesmen 464, Delegate Showler reported the Park Commissioners had let the milk contract to a Union firm and thanked the Labor members of the Board for their assistance.

Local 94 Meatcutters, New Westminster, delegate reported on the Dance to be held in the Trianon on the 7th and requested all members to help make it a success. Also that they had endorsed the May Day celebrations. Engineers 882, Delegate King reported they had endorsed May Day and that they were endeavoring to raise money to put a float in the parade.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS: -- The question of a speaker for May Day was taken up and delegate Shearer was elected.

NEW BUSINESS: -- Delegate Snowler introduced the question of the Plebiscite being taken on Health Insurance and stating that the Teamsters locals have endorsed the question of Health Insurance 100% and introduced the following resolution:

whereas if this plebiscite fails to carry by a majority of the votes of our citizens, the whole principle of Health Insurance will be set back for many years,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED That this Council circulate all Labor Unions in this Province and ask their cooperation in circulating all their members and their friends to get out and vote for the plebiscite on Health Insurance.

Delegate Maskell of the Inland Boatmen's Union brought up the question of the dance being held on behalf of the "Policy Committee" of the Maritime Workers and it was explained by the Delegate from the I.L.A. that they were not in favor of the Committee. The Secretary of the Council pointed out that some of the organizations in the Committee were not affiliated. Taxi Drivers 151 Delegate Shaw impressed on delegates the need for asking for the Union button and thanked the Beverage Dispensers for assistance rendered to Local 151.

Butchers 95-Del. Bohart report that his Union had passed a vote of thanks to the Secretary of the Council for assistance rendered Local 95 and for the work that had been done regarding the Trade Union Act. Brother Silver, organizer for the Int. Seamen's Union who is visiting the City was invited to the platform. He reported on conditions

within the jurisdiction of his organization, particularly on the Pacific Coast and referred to the A. F. of L. and C.I.O. controversy as existing on the other side of the Line. Thanked the delegates for invitation to address them. Received with appreciation and interest.

As there were clauses in the Bill detrimental to the established Trade Unions, the following delegation immediately went to Victoria. E.H. Morrison as Chairman of the B.C. Executive of the Trades Congress, Percy R. Bengough as Vice President of the Trades and Labor Congress, E.A. Jamieson as Pres. of this Council and R. H. Neelands, representing the Allied Printing Trades Council.

This delegation interviewed the Minister of Labor in Victoria and as a result they did get changes made, making the Bill more compatible to the Trade Unions. "On motion the report was received and actions

of the delegation endorsed."

Secretary further reported that among other things, Brother Youhill, President of the Trades and Labor Council in Victoria, was quoted in the papers as publicly stating that Labor representatives from Vancouver had endeavored only to put through a Bill of their own and that the Bill now brought in by the Government was a Magna Charta for Labor.

It was moved, seconded and carried unanimously that the statements of Pres. Youhill of Victoria be repudiated by this Council as the Bill was not by any means the Magna Charta of Labor and the Labor representatives referred to had endeavored to get only the Congress Bill enac-

Moved, seconded and carried that the report of the Executive as a whole be adopted.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES: -- Delegate Showler reported for the Traffic Safety Council that a change had been made in the Automobile Act whereby the ultimate owner of the car is liable for automobile accidents. As this is something that we have been requesting for many years, particularly in relation to U-Drive cars, the report was received with appreciation.

Committee appointed to consider the question of a banquet, Delegate W. Stewart reported they had considered the question and recommended that the banquet be held on the third Tuesday in January and that delegates be sent tickets at \$1.50 each. Following discussion the report of the Committee was received and endorsed."

It was further decided to send a letter to each Local affiliated with the Council requesting them to send their delegates and officers

to the banquet.

Organizer Weinberger of the Hotel and Restaurant Employees who is visiting the City was invited to the platform and dealt with the progress being made by his organization which had increased its membership from 22,000 in January 1923 to 185,000 at the present time. It should be distinctly understood that the Boycott of Japanese and Fascist goods is not intended in any way to be construed into a boycott against Japanese residents here. The matter of driving the Japanese Fishermen off the Fraser River and refusing to patronize Japanese stores is not the policy of this Council. The Boycott is against Imperialism in Japan-against the purchase of good from Japan and against the shipment of War material to Japan.

Moved, seconded and carried that this Council reiterate its previous stand as being opposed to Anti Oriental Ratial Prejudice campaign as being carried on by some in this City.

Moved, seconded and carried that this Council organize a Trade Union class, the Executive to bring about its formation.

Moved by Delegate Munro, seconded and carried that credentials be given to Local 95 Meatcutters to solicit loans from affiliated Unions for organizing purposes.

Moved by Delegate Shearer, seconded and carried that the Council

endorse the recommendations of the Boycott Committee; that the question of the Mass Pickett be taken up with affiliated Unions to report back at the next meeting.

Moved, seconded and carried that we endorse the drawing up of a booklet on "How and Why to Boycott Goods made in Japan".

Moved, seconded and carried that the Boycott Committee be given the power to call a meeting of Wives and daughters of Trade Union members to form a Ladies Auxiliary.

Moved, seconded and carried that credentials be given to members

of the Boycott Committee to address affiliated Unions.

QUESTIONS BY MEMBERS: - Del. Morrison asked if the Electrical Work in

Union cafes was being done by Union men. Del. W. Stewart replied.

Del. Cook of the Boilermakers asked the Secty. as to the attitude of the International Federation of Trade Unions regarding the Boycott. Secretary replied.

In reply to a question, Del. Maxwell replied that the clerks in the Piggly Wiggly and Safeway Stores were organized in North Vancouver New Westminster and West Vancouver.

GOOD AND WELFARE: --

Delegate Jackson, Cannery Workers 105, reported there are 12,000 workers in the B. C. Canning industry and that the employers are trying to get a reduction in the Provincial Minimum Wages at the request of the B. C. Canners.

It was pointed out by the Secretary of the Council that on many occasions we have attended the meetings of the hearings of the Board and that the Canners in B. C. are the same companies which are operating in Quebec and Ontario. In the East they claim they are unable to pay higher wages on account of the cheap Oriental Labor in the West.

In the West they claim they are unable to pay better wages because of the cheap labor in Quebec. This situation is to be watched by the Executive when being dealt with by the Provincial Minimum Wage Board.

Delegate R. MacAulay pointed out the danger of splits and divisions in the Labor Movement, at this time when there is every need of the working class getting together to offset the introduction of Fascism and suggested that the Council Executive bring in a brief on a suggested policy.

Meeting adjourned at 10:00 p.m.

Draper, President Trades and Labor Congress replying to the resolution adopted by the Council requesting the Congress to initiate an organization campaign on behalf of the Butcher Workmen and stating that the last Convention did not set up such a Department but referred the matter to the Executive Council as finances and circumstances permitted. That it was not possible at this time to initiate a

National organizing campaign. "On motion received and noted."
(2) Kyuquot Trollers Cooperative requesting information regarding Packing Houses as they do not intend to deal with any firm known to be Unfair to its employees. "On motion received and noted with appreciation and information supplied.

(3) Mr. Jock Ness, requesting financial assistance to provide transportation to the Yukon. "On motion received and referred to Meatcutters Local 95."

(4) Dept. Trade and Industries, Victoria, extending an invitation to attend a meeting being held by the Hon. W.G. Asselstine to get views on the canned foods business and the threatened importation of such goods from Eastern Canada. "On motion invitation accepted and the President and Secretary to attend."

(5) May Day Conference Committee requesting this Council to send an official speaker to the May Day celebrations. Executive recommended that the communication be received and filed and the Council not to be officially represented. Following considerable discussion, on a standing vote, 54 delegates voted for and 58 against. A motion was then offered that the Council send a speaker and the Chair ruled that such a motion was out of order and could not be accepted, as the policies of the Trade Union Movement to which we are affiliated is to recognize the first Monday in September as the Labor Day established by organized Labor.

Delegate Shearer challenged the ruling of the Chair and desired to be so recorded in the minutes.

(6) B.C.Projectionists 348, requesting a letter regarding the status of the new Reo Theatre. The Secretary read a letter containing a statement prepared by the Executive at a meeting held on the 22nd of March at which a delegation from the Projectionists was present. The Executive were unanimous in expressing their appreciation of the valuable assistance rendered by the various officers of the Projectionists Union and extended permission to Local 348 to supply Projectionists to the Reo Theatre, in view of the peculiar situation confronting that organization. At the same time requesting our affiliated members not to patronize this theatre. Following discussion the recommendation of the Executive was endorsed. (7) Vancouver Typographical Union 226, submitting the following esolution: WHEREAS, it is with some concern that Vancouver Typographcal Union No. 226 has observed that for quite a while, Vancouver, New Westminster and District Trades and Labor Council has been devoting a great deal of time and effort to matters other than those for which Trade Unions were formed, viz., betterment of wages, shortening of hours and improvement of working conditions, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that Vancouver Typographical Union No. 226, in regular monthly meeting assembled, and with a majority of its members present, request the Vancouver, New Westminster and District Trades and Labor Council for an outline of its present policies, aims and objects. The Executive recommended that the letter be received and the

following principles be reiterated and endorsed.

"That the policy of this Council is to advance the interests of its affiliated Unions in conformity with the policies of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada and the American Federation of Labor.

We feel that the attention of the affiliated membership should be called to the fact that the Trade Union Movement as represented in this Council is a Non Political organization. Subject to the constitutions of the various Unions, our members have freedom as individuals and citizens to belong to and participate in any and all political parties. However, the best interests of our Movement are not served when members endeavor to introduce their Political beliefs and policies into the Trades Union Movement.

We ask and expect the cooperation of affiliated Unions and members to endeavor to keep such questions entirely out of the Council meetings. "On motion the recommendation of the Executive was endorsed."

(8) Greater Vancouver Youth Council re sending a speaker to this "On motion received and the privilege of the floor to be ex-Council. tended."

(9) Labor Representation Committee, New Westminster, requesting a speaker from this Council either to their meeting on April 7th or 14th. "On motion received and the matter left in the hands of the President and Secretary."

We Deeply Regret that the Organizing Committee of this Vancouver. New Westminster and District Trades and Labor Council did cause organizing meetings to be held on the premises of a Local Union that is affiliated with a dual organization, and therefore highly objectionable to this Council: and

We further regret and deplore the unwarranted and inexcusable invasion of the jurisdictions of at least three of the International

Unions affiliated with this Council: and

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that all future organization meetings be held in Labor Headquarters, Beatty Street, unless otherwise expressly permitted by this Council; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that hereafter the Organization Committee shall call meetings of unorganized groups only after the President and Secretary of this Council and the officers of the Local Unions effected have been notified in writing.

"Following considerable discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried that the resolution be endorsed by a standing vote of 73 for

and 48 against."

Organizing Committee-Delegate Stewart reported holding a number of meetings with the employees of the Clayburn Brick Co. and that they are applying for a Federal charter.

REPORTS OF UNIONS:--

Sheet Metal Workers, Delegate Macpherson reported they are against any per capita increase. Also reported that kitchen equipment for the Canadian National Hotel is being purchased in the East and they desire the Council to send a protest.

"On motion the minutes were adopted as corrected."

Brother John P. Frey, President of the Metal Trades Dept. of the A. F. of L., was in attendance and was invited to the platform. The Chairman introduced Brother Frey to the delegates and stated that he had been invited to address the meeting at 9:00 p.m. CREDENTIALS:

Boot & Shoe Workers 505 -- for T.C.Kennedy in place of Gardner. Civic Employees 28 -- for H. Ashton, H. Harris, W. Offer, A. Patterson, R. Pearson, J. Reid, W.J. Soribbins.

"On motion credentials received and those present obligated."

Executive reported on meeting held the same evening. Members present E.Smith, D.Macpherson, B.Showler, P.Bengough, C. Stewart, T. Holland and E.A.Jamieson.

(1) General Truck Drivers Union, Powell River Branch, requesting that the Westview Dairy be placed on the "We Do Not Patronize" list as they had been unable to negotiate with this Company and that they were very antagonistic. "On motion received and the request to be taken up with the Pulp and Sulphite and Paper Makers Unions of Powell River and concurred in."

(2) Victoria Trades & Labor Council minutes of their meeting of April 6th. "On motion received and filed for reference."

(3) Printing Pressmen 69 reporting that they are in favor of the 1-cent increase in Per Capita tax. "On motion received and noted (4) Mr. James Tester of the Workers' Cooperative of New Ontario reporting that the salesmen for Burns and Co. are intensely worried that the Co-op handles a very high percentage of the meat business in New Ontario. Also that other stores are cutting down on Burns products. The salesmen informed them that matters were being straightened out in B. C. Secretary of the Council replied setting out that the Burns Products were still on the "We Do Not Patronize" list and that to date no adjustment had been made. Secretary further reported that under the Financial report of the Burns Company, under the heading of "Burns and Co. Income Shows Big Decline". The receipts for 1937 were \$27,843 as against \$195,385 in 1936. Labor trouble and wage increases were given as the reasons reponsible for the decline according to the report of the Company.

Moved, seconded and carried that the correspondence be received, the action of the Secretary endorsed and the financial report of the Burns Company received with appreciation.

(5) Bro. Chas. A. Watson, Secretary-Treasurer Local S-18 Fire Fighters notifying that they had procured the reinstatement of Burneby B.C. Fire Fighters Local 323, that the Charter would be presented at an early date and they will then be making application for affiliated to this Council. "On motion received and noted."

(6) Trades and Labor Congress of Canada acknowledging receipt of Per Capita tax and extending good wishes to the delegates. "On

(7) Telegram sent by Secretary to the Pres. of the Can. Nat. Railways, protesting the letting of contracts to firms in the East when so many competent mechanics are unemployed here. Also Mr. Hungerford's wire replying stating that the contract for kitchen equipment had been let to the lowest tenderer and that Local firms

would have every opportunity to quote on a competetive basis for other installations. "On motion received and left in the hands of the

Executive to take up further."

(8) Correspondence between the Secty. and the David Neon Ltd. Secretary reported having drawn up an agreement, copies of which had been accepted by the Company for the purpose of attaching their seal but had not been returned. As a result a registered letter had been sent to the Company notifying them that the documents received from this Council were null and void. "On motion received and the action of the Secretary endorsed."

(9) Hotel & Restaurant Empl. 28, regarding the dispute at the Chanticleer Lunch which had been referred to a conciliation commissioner under the Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act. As this dispute arose during a Christmas rush the unwarranted delay on the part of the Government had been entirely favorable to the Management. That they were in favor of amending or appealing the Act. Secretary reported that the Provincial Executive of the Trades & Labor Congress of Canada had written for an interview with the Premier to secure a definite interpretation of the Act, believing that the interpretation of the Minister of Labor is at variance with the desires of the Govt. The position taken by the Minister of Labour is one of refusing to recognize established Trade Unions. "Moved, seconded and carried that the report of the Executive as a whole be adopted."

REPORTS OF OFFICERS & COMMITTEES:--

Secretary reported having attended with the President, a meeting called by the Prov. Minister of Trade & Industry to consider the question of the importation of canned goods from the East and that tentative arrangements had been arrived at to keep Eastern Products out of the B.C.Market. "On motion received."

Boycott Committee -- Delegate Shearer reported that the Committee had met since the last meeting and were recommending and would introduce a motion under New Business, that a special meeting of the Council be held on April 26th at 8 p.m. "On motion report received."

REPORTS OF UNIONS:-

Butchers Local 94 -- Delegate Hughes reported that they are endeavoring to meet the Swift Canadian Company for the purpose of getting the Company to recognize the right of collective bargaining and to recognize their Union as a bargaining agent.

Teamsters Local 31 -- Delegate Atkinson reported the North West Messengers and Skillings Transfer had been signed up. They are also requesting that the Leslie Coal Company be placed on the "Unfair"

list.

Painters 138-Delegate Smith reported that his Local is requesting that Happyland at Hastings Park be placed on the Non Patronage list as they are getting painting and sign writing done under Non Union conditions.

Milksalesmen 464 -- Delegate Showler reported that they are en-

deavoring to organize the National Dairies.

Office Employees -- Del. MacDonald reported that they were against the 1-cent increase in Per Capita. Also wished to be recorded as resenting the actions of Engineers Local 882 who had taken it on themselves to write to the Office Employees' headquarters desiring information re forming a Union and asking that an organizer be sent in, all of which had been done without consulting the officers of the affiliated Union.

Barbers 120 -- Del. Herrett reported that they had signed up the Barber Shop at 611 Smithe Street and at 632 Howe Street and also the barber shop at Union Bay, B.C. Further reported that a pamphlet was being put out dealing with the barbering trade and the Union wished to state that they are in no way connected with this publication.

Carpenters 452 -- Delegate Page reported that members were not patronizing the Rio Theatre and as a result the prices at the theatre

had been lowered in anendeavor to get patronage.

Civic Employees 25-Del. Ashton reported they were endeavoring to get a five-cent increase with an additional weeks holiday. They also wished to correct the misleading statements that had been made that the Civic Employees had received 20% increase, because no increase of wages had made to the outside men.

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Railway Carmen 58 -- Delegate Warde reported that they are busy getting ready for the Division 4 and Carmen's convention. That they are inviting Bro. Tallon, Pres. of Div. 4; Bro. Bengough from the Trades & Labor Congress of Canada and Bro. Jamieson representing this Council. Also that they were presenting 25-year membership badges to 19 of their members on this occasion.

Jewelry Workers 42 -- Delegate Hawken reported that they are endeavoring to organize the Jewelry Workers on the Pacific Coast and also that the local is opposed to the ruling given by the President of this Council on the question of May Day at the last meeting.

Projectionists 348-Del. Woolridge reported the strike at Alberni had been satisfactorily settled and that the Capitol theatre there was now operating on a Union basis. Also complimented the Kitsilano Boy's Band who had refused to play at this theatre while it was non Union and instead had played at the opposition house which operated on a Union

Railway Carmen 280-Delegate reported that they are also getting ready for the Div. 4 and Carmens' convention. Also that they are in

favor of the Boycott Committee.

Domestic Workers 91 -- Del. Dougan reported they had a Committee set up of representative citizens to consider the wages and working conditions of those in Domestic service. That the Secretary of this Council would be invited to be on the Committee. Also with the cooperation of the Social Agencies and others they had set up a recreational committee for the purpose of opening up a clubroom.

Also dealt with the C.I.O. question which is an issue of paramount importance throughout the United States. Bro. Frey pointed out that the C.I.O. Committee was started as a minority group in the A.F. of L. in opposition to the majority vote in a democratic organization. Further reported on the increase of membership which had been secured by the A. F. of L. during the last few months.

The address was both interesting and instructive and was received with appreciation and applause by the delegates.

Further reported that the work of organizing was being carried on, new members being secured and that on Thursday, May 5th a smoker had been arranged for the membership of Lodges 692, 182 and 151 in this district to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Machinists Union and to entertain visiting machinists attending Div. 4 convention.

Projectionists 34g - Del. Woolridge reported on the Rio Theatre. Inland Boatmen - Del. Maskell reported they were having trouble to the formation of a Union called the "Union S. s. Mutual Benefit Grievance Committee to investigate.

Painters 138-Del. Smith reported a number coming from the East accepting employment as painters below established rates. Also reported that they have an organizing campaign on during the month of

Boot & Shoe Workers 505 - Delegate Kennedy reported that they have endeavored to secure agreements from the various shoe repair of the Employers including the firm of Price in Mount Pleasant and Realizer Cornells of Carnot Repair, Granville Street.

Railway Carmen 58-Del. Warde reported they are holding their convention in the Hotel Vancouver. That they are having an annual members. They also have the seasonal reduction in time.

Railway Carmen 280 - Delegate reported they are having a social on Thursday for the Carmen's delegates who are in the City.

Brother Tallon, Secty-Treas. Trades & Labor Congress of Canada and President Division 4, addressed the Council on current events throughout Canada and complimented the Local organizations on the strength of the Movement that had collectively built up. He stressed the need of giving preference to locking after conditions in Justices further away that were being combatted by the Movement in that particular district. Brother Tallon pointed out what had been

GOOD AND WELFARE: -- Del. Showler called attention of the delegates to the interpretation placed on the Labour and Conciliation Act by the Minister of Labour, which was resulting in the Unions being entirely ignored even where they have 100% organization and that undoubtedly the Hon. Mr. Pearson's interpretations are in favor of the employers in many instances. That employers are taking full advantage of the situation. Also pointed out that the Women's bakery have stated that they did not wish to continue existing agreements. That the matter has been taken up by the Prov. Dept. of Labour and that the forms called for the signatures of employees.

The question of holding meetings and other methodsof combatting the particularly adverse features of the legislation were considered and it was decided on motion to postpone such actions until after the Provincial Executive of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada had a meeting with the Government.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this Council condemns in the strongest possible lamguage the action of the Dom. Govt. for their total lack of sympathy in handling this problem and asks that an impartial commission similar in nature to the one which investigated the Penitentiary situation in the Dominion, be immediately appointed to investigate and place the blame for the violence upon the responsible

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a Public Works program be instituted immediately and that in the interim, relief be granted to the unemployed boys, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be sent to the responsible parties mentioned herein and to all affiliated Trades and Labor Councils in the Dominion of Canada.

Machinists, reported a Charter had arrived for the Auto Mechanics and local was now meeting twice monthly. Asked all delegates to tell their auto mechanic friends.

Painters 138, reported all Union painters on First Narrows bridge, also all Oil companies except the Imperial now paying the Union rates.

(5) B.C. Coast Dist. Council Int. Woodworkers, notifying that they have set up a relief and defense committee for the Blubber Bay strikers and that they desire to canvass the Trade Unions in Van. The Executive recommended that we recommend to the affiliated Unions that this Blubber Bay strike is worthy of support of organized labor. "On motion carried."

(6) B.C.Motion Picture Operators, enclosing copy of letter from Local 299 of Winnipeg. The letter from Winnipeg setting out what had been done by the so-called one big Union of Winnipeg in signing up a "Yellow Dog Contract" with some of the Theatre owners without consulting the Union men employed. "On motion received and delegates requested to report on same in their Local Union."

(7) United Fishermen B.C. Local 44 thanking the Secretary of the Council for assisting their organization during the negotiations with the employers on the Pilchard Agreement and prices. "On motion

received and noted."

(8) The City Clerk regarding a meeting to be held in the City Hall on Aug. 1st to consider the question of license fees for contractors. As some of the Unions directly affected were participating in the meeting the same was on motion filed.

(9) Committee to boost City Manager plan. "On motion received and as this Council believes in elections, was on motion received

and filed.

(10) Pulp and Sulphite Workers, Powell River 76, requesting information regarding the interview held by the Prov. Exec. and the Prov. Govt. "On motion received and left in the hands of the Secty.

for reply."

(11) Winnipeg and Dist. Trades Council enclosing copy of a letter sent to Prime Minister Mackenzie King, the Minister of Justice and the Minister of Labor, Premier Pattullo and the Mayor of the City of Vancouver, as a result of a request sent from this Council regarding the treatment of the Single Unemployed. "On motion received in appreciation and filed for reference."

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(12) Winnipeg Trades & Labor Council regarding a select committee of the Manitoba Legislation appointed for the purpose of investigating the Packing Industry and requesting information regarding Burns & Co. treatment of their employees in Vancouver for the purpose of evidence. "On motion received and information forwarded."

(13) Workers' Co-operative of New Ontario requesting a progress report on the Burns strike. "On motion received and information to be supplied." Secretary pointed out that this Cooperative has rendered

valuable assistance.

(14) Convention Call to the Trades & Labor Congress of Canada, requesting delegates to the 54th Annual Convention in Niagara Falls, Ont. commencing Sept. 12, 1938. Executive reported having considered the question and recommended that the Council send three delegates, one of whom to be the Secty. of the Council. "On motion concurred in." For the other two vacancies the Executive recommended the nomination of delegates Jamieson, Macpherson and W. Stewart. "On motion concurred in." It was moved, seconded and carried that the report of the Executive as a whole be adopted.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS & COMMITTEES: -- Grievance Committee -- Delegate Macpherson reported unable to reach an agreement with the Empress Dairies and it was therefore recommended that this Company be placed on the "We Do Not Patronize" list as requested by the Milksalesmen's Union. "On motion concurred in." Delegate also reported of an interview with the Exhibition Board regarding the rate of wages being paid to their employees and that as a result of the representations made by the grievance Committee the Board had agreed to raise the rate of wages from 53-1/4 to 57-5/8 cents per hour. "On motion the report received in appreciation."

Organizing Committee: -- Delegate C. Stewart reported that a representative of the International Pulp & Sulphite employees had been in the City in an endeavor to organize the National Paper Box Co., 163 W. 3rd Ave., but that the Company had offset the efforts made by

setting up a Company Union.

It was moved by delegate Munro that the representative of the Blubber May strikers be given ten minutes and same being carried the Secretary of the Blubber Bay local outlined what had taken place. That they had complied with the Arbitration Act and had carried on for six months and that the final wage was acceptable to the men but the Company had refused. It was also reported that men and their families were being evicted from the Company houses and that 13 of the men are facing trial. Same being received with interest and referred to the Local Unions.

REPORTS OF UNIONS: --

Meatoutters 94--delegate Hughes reported that they had held a meeting to consider the question of the Assembley Plant Union and Local 94 and had voted 71% for having their own Union. Del. Hughes also reported that the Swift Co. were at least more fair to organized Labor than any of the other companies.

<u>Milksalesmen 464-Del.</u> Showler reported that the Boilermakers had

a picnic and had purchased non-union milk supplies.

Painters 138-Del. Smith reported their cooperation with the Building Trades Council and that they had eliminated the spraying machine on work at the Canadian National Hotel. Also that he had been successful in organizing a Local and installing a charter with the Automobile Painters.

Sheet Metal Wkrs. 280-Del. Macpherson called attention that the time for repairing furnaces had arrived and reminded delegates and members to insist on the work being done in a Union shop.

Hotel & Rest. Empl. 28-Del. Gateman reported that the Georgia and Vancouver Hotels had signed an Agreement for a 5% increase in wages and Banquet money, also that all the restaurants with which they had Agreements had resigned with the exception of the Trocadero Cafe.

Bakers 468-Del. Humphreys reported they are holding a pionic at Newcastle Island on August 20th. Also that they had an arbitration board and the Board had recommended a closed shop and other gains in conditions. Also thanked President Jamieson for assistance given in adjusting a difficulty at the Woman's Bakery.

Railway Carmen -- Delegate Shearer reported they are holding a second annual smoker on Fri. Aug. 12th at 8:30 at the Legion Hall,

Seymour Street.

Cannery Wkrs. 105-Del. Jackson reported they had submitted a brief to the minimum wage Board recommending improved regulations in the Canning industry and that some gain had resulted from the interview. Also thanked Secretary Bengough for his assistance.

Carpenters 452-Del. Wilson reported they had a strike on some of the larger uptown jobs, and that an Arbitration Board had been set up and a scale of wages set at 90 cents instead of 80 cents as the employ-

ers were endeavoring to pay.

Meatcutters 95 Del. Douglas reported the Canada Packers were not very favorable to organized Labor and that in his opinion Swift Co. were the best of any of the Packing Companies.

Jewelry Wkrs--Del. reported it is not possible to get the Union

Label on any jewelry work in Vancouver.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS: (Committees appointed)

Organizing Committee: Del. C.Stewart elected Chairman. Delegates appointed: Bengough, W. Stewart, Maxwell, Macaulay.

Grievance Committee: Del. Macpherson elected Chairman. Delegates

Bengough, Showler, Pritchard, Cowper appointed.

Press Committee: Del. T. Holland elected Chairman. Appointed,

Bengough, Gouthro, Showler, Cowper.

ELECTION OF DELEGATES TO CONGRESS CONVENTION:

Delegates E. A. Jamieson, D. Macpherson, W. Stewart nominated. Delegate Jamieson receiving 75; delegate Macpherson 48 and delegate W. Stewart 78. Delegates Stewart and Jamieson elected.

Question of financing delegates to the Convention was suggested that Local Unions not sending delegates themselves could contribute

in sending delegates from the Council.

Audit Committee, delegates R.H. Neelands, J. Rankin and R. Atkinson appointed.

NEW BUSINESS: --

On motion of del. Gateman the question of placing the Trocadero Cafe on the "We Do Not Patronize" list of the Council for refusing to sign an Agreement was "On motion referred to the Grievance Committee". On motion of Del. Showler that the legislative committee consider some changes in the bail situation in the City Police station. Delegate Showler pointed out that Civic Employees are collecting \$5.00 for making out such Bond. "On motion carried."

QUESTIONS BY MEMBERS:

Del. Hughes asked regarding the Conciliation Act and the report of the Committee on same. Pres. Jamieson replied that the Committee would report next meeting.

Question was asked regarding the Butchers & Meatoutters in Chain

stores.

Question was asked regarding the Council issuing a book on Union Label firms.

Pres. asked delegates from the Jewelry workers if they are Union members in O.B.Allan's. Del. replied they had Union men but it is not

a Union shop and cannot supply the Label.

Relief Project Workers thanking the Council for the support and pointed out that the Agreement which had been reached was not entirely satisfactory but they would carry along with it and that what they desire is the Government to implement work and wages promised by setting up bonafide public works.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Secretary give a report on his attending the I.L.O. at the next meeting of the Council.

Minutes of the regular meeting held on Tuesday, August 16th, 1938. Meeting opened at 8:15 p.m. President Jamieson in the Chair. Minutes of the previous meeting were adopted as mailed.

CREDENTIALS: - Engineers 115, for J. McIvor in place of C.McCallum. Machinists 692 -- George Sangster in place of A. Tait. "On motion credentials received and delegates present obligated."

Executive reported on meeting held the same evening. Members present, Holland, Jamieson, Bengough, W. Stewart, C.Stewart, Fordyce and Morrison.

CORRESPONDENCE:

(1) Relief Project Workers Union regarding the arrangement for temporary representation allowed them by the Council which had expired and requesting that they be granted permanent representation. Executive reported having considered the question at length and that the majority recommendation was that this Council adhere to its Constituttion as set out in Section 1 of Article 2, "That this Council shall be composed of such Trade Unions as are eligible according to the constitution of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada and the American Rederation of Labor." The Chair ruled that as the request was in confliction with the Constitution that the question was out of order."

(2) Street Railwaymen Div. 101, enclosing 4 resolutions that have

been endorsed by their Organization:

(a) WHEREAS at the 53rd Convention of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, a resolution proposing the establishment of an Organizational Department of the Congress was endorsed in principal, but so far no definite action in this regard has been taken by the Dominion Executive. and

WHEREAS such a department would facilitate the organization of thousands of workers, and would be a unifying force throughout the

whole Canadian Trade Union Movement,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the 54th Convention of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, assign a sufficient amount of money to care for the operation of such a Department which should be set up without further delay. "On motion received and endorsed."

(b) WHEREAS on the 17th day of June 1936 the democratically elected Government of Spain was attacked by International Fascism in an attempt to rob the Spanish people of their democratic institutions and

WHEREAS the democratic Government of Canada has placed an embargo upon the shipment of War material to the Loyalist Government of Spain when an abundance of war material is transported from this country to the Insurgents through the ports of Portugal,

WE THEREFORE PETITION the 54th Convention of the Trades and Labor Congress to take up with the Federal Government the immediate lifting of the embargo on Loyalist Spain and to stop the shipment of War material to the Insurgents who are the enemies of the Canadian people. "On motion received and endorsed."

(c) WHEREAS at the 52nd and 53rd Conventions of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada the trend was toward a united Trade Union Movement, where craft and industrial unions could be built up side by side, and WHEREAS this policy has been ably carried out in the past two years, thousands of new members being recruited to our Unions by the adoption

of this policy,

THEREFORE we, the members of Division 101 of the Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Railway and Motor Coach employees of America, Vancouver, B. C., petition the 54th Convention of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada to maintain the status quo so that the thousands of workers still unorganized can be drawn into our Trade Union Movement,

WE FURTHER COMMEND the Dominion Executive of the Trades and Labor Congress for ably carrying out the decisions of the 52nd and 53rd conventions and we trust that no obstacles will be allowed in the future, as in the past, to interfere with a united Canadian Trade Union

Mo vement.

Executive recommended nonconcurrence in this resolution. Following discussion on the question, it was moved and seconded in amendment that this resolution be referred back to Division 101. "On a showof-hands vote, 47 voted to refer back and 62 against." Amendment lost.

It was moved, seconded and carried that we concur in the resolution. (Del. Atkinson, Truck Drivers, wished to be recorded as voting against this resolution.)

(d) BE IT RESOLVED that the 54th Convention of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, again go on record as being opposed to the operation of One-Man Street cars, or One Man busses, as same are a menace to the operators, and a danger to the travelling public and that the Congress petition the Federal Government to make illegal the operation of One Man Street Cars or One Man busses on the streets of our cities. "On motion received and endorsed."

(3) Hotel & Restaurant Empl. 28, submitting a resolution as passed by Local 28 that the condemnation of the infamous Padlock Law as passed by the Duplessis government be again reiterated and the Dom. Govt. asked to immediately have the validity of this law tested in Court. That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the 54th Convention of the Trades and Labor Congress. "On motion received and endorsed"

Also a similar resolution submitted by Vice Pres. Fordyoe demanding that the Padlock Law be strukk from the statutes of Quebec and requesting the Federal Govt. to declare the Act ultra vires. "On motion endorsed by the Council and referred back to the Bricklayers for them to forward to Congress."

(4) Bellingham Central Labor Council, inviting delegates to attend their Labor Day picnic at Whatcom Falls Park. "On motion received with appreciation and delegates requested to note and any who can attend on the 5th are requested to register their names at the Council office."

(5) Director Vancouver Council Social Agencies asking for a meeting of either with the Executive or the Council to discuss the questions
of relationship between organized Social work and Organized Labor. "On
motion received and Mr. Davidson to be invited to address the next meeting for 10 mimutes."

(6) B.C.Coast Dist. Council I.W.A., dealing with the sentences given to 14 strikers at Blubber Bay and stating that some convicted were not in the vicinity at the time of the trouble and were afterwards pointed out to the Police by the Company officials. Request the Council to protest to the Attorney General the manner in which the trials had been held and to urge for the granting of a retrial. "On motion received and request complied with."

(7) Viotoria & Dist. Trades Council minutes of their meeting held on Aug. 3rd. "On motion received with appreciation and filed for reference."

(8) Vancouver Housing Assoc. requesting that a representative be sent to their Housing Committee. "On motion received and referred to the Building Trades Council."

(9) Copy of wire forwarded by the Secty. to the convention of the Hotel & Rest. Empl. in convention in San Francisco, extending fraternal greetings and good wishes from this Council. "On motion received & action of Secty in sending come and read "

of Secty. in sending same endorsed."

(10) A.T.Berg, member Seattle Local Typographical "202, relative to putting on a Union Label Guide. "It was moved by delegate Holland that this Council endorse the issuing of a Union Label Guide as requested in Mr. A.T.Berg's letter to Pres. Jamieson. The Label Guide to contain a comprehensive list of Union Label goods, Union made goods and firms and stores that are fair to organized labor. The Guide must not contain advertisements from Unfair or objectionable firms and is to be published without any cost whatsoever to the Trades and Labor Council and further that 10% of the net revenue be paid into the treasury of the Council; the work to start as soon as practicable, completed with dispatch and distributed free to the delegates to this Council and to the affiliated membership. "On motion endorsed."

The Chairman announced the following delegates appointed to the Legislative Committee to act with Delegate E.H.Morrison elected Chairman: Bengough, Showler, Neelands, Pritchard, Rankin, Ed. Smith, R. MacAulay, Couper and Astbury. "It was moved, seconded and carried that the report of the Executive as amended be adopted."

REPORTS OF OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES: -- Secretary reported that only 29 Unions had taken a ballot of their membership and the returns were 1482 in favor of upholding the decision of the Executive Board and 182 opposed. Secty. further reported a number of communications received

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from different organizations, some protesting the action of the Executive Board and stating that they for that reason were not taking a ballot and others stating that they were not taking a ballot as they thought it unnecessary and were in favor of the action of the Executive Board. On motion report received.

Organization Committee-Del. C. Stewart reported: The organizing Committee of the Trades and Labor Council is not satisfied with the progress being made in recruiting new members to our Unions. Organizational work has been done in a very spasmodic manner; instead of the organizing committee being the driving force in a continuous organizing campaign we have been satisfied to wait until we heard of a group of workers desirous of joining a Union, then we go and offer our assistance.

The growth of Company Unionism in Vancouver and throughout the province has brought forcibly home to us the necessity of a continuous organizational and Trade Union educational campaign being conducted by the Trades and Labor Council.

We therefore recommend for your approval as the first steps to or-

ganize every unorganized worker in this District:

(1) that a compiled list of all industrial establishments in this district covered by the Vancouver, New Westminster Trades and Labor Council, be supplied to the Organizing Committee, including the number of employees and any other information that would be

valuable to this Committee.
(2) An organizing campaign of the dimensions proposed by the Organizing Committee will require the assistance and cooperation of the whole Trade Union Movement. We therefore recommend that regular monthly meetings be held by the Committee with delegates appointed or elected from all Local Unions who are willing to assist the Committee in the work of making Vancouver a 100% Union town and that all Local Unions affiliated to the Van. New West. Trades and Labor Council be written to informing them of the organizational plans of this Council, petitioning all Locals to appaint or elect delegates to assist the organizing Committee as proposed and send the names and addresses to the Secretary of the Trades and Labor Council or the chairman of the Organization Committee. "On motion received and endorsed."

The Committee set up to consider the Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act submitted a report and members are requested to note that these suggested amendments together with the sections of the Act referred to are to be published in full in the next issue of the Labor Statesman. *On motion report received and organizations to be given the opportunity to consider before the report is dealt with at the first Council meeting in October.

Delegate Showler reported re the bail bond question that he had received a copy of the report on the question from the City and the claim is made that the \$5.00 fee was charged for the cases which were referred to the County Court. Also that the matter is still being investigated.

REPORTS OF UNIONS: -- Stage Empl. 118, del. Pearson reported they are having trouble with the Exhibition Board who have given a contract to a Non Union man for the erection and operation of a stage.

Jam. Vegetable Canners, del. Lee reported they had a request to meet the Minimum Wage Board and that the Canning companies stated they had no intention of canning tomatoes unless prices to growers and wages to the cannery workers were reduced and that such action on the part of the employers is breaking down their conditions.

NEW BUSINESS: The question of the Stage Employees Union and the Exhibition Board was on motion referred to the Grievance Committee.

Del. Fordyce introduced the question of City Manager and that the City Manager committee had submitted a list of six thousand names of citizens in favor of the City Manager plan. That these names were being checked by the City and a special meeting of the City Council would then be held to consider the question. Delegate Fordyce was appointed to represent the Council when such a meeting takes place.

President called attention to an item in the press dealing with the proposal of the City to set up a Committee to investigate the City not invited. On motion, Secretary to ask why this Council was

Delegate Holland introduced the question of parking meters and moved that this Council go on record as being opposed to their introduction. Following considerable discussion in which the Taxi Drivers and Teamsters stated that they were opposed to the motion and moved in vote being taken on the amendment, 31 voted for and 40 against. The motion was then put and carried.

It was moved, seconded and carried that this Council endorse the statements of Alderman DeGraves made in the City Council, in which he stated that City contracts should set out the compulsory payment of "Union" wages instead of the word "Fair" wages as now contained.

It was moved by Del. W. Stewart, seconded and carried that we extend an invitation to a representative from the Civil Liberties Union to address the Council for 10 minutes at the next regular meeting.

Meeting adjourned at 10:35 p.m.

The daily occurrence of which is already so common that the conscience of mankind has almost become blunted; and whereas, no policy has yet been announced on behalf of our Government, pledging support for action against

aggressor nations.

THEREFORE, be it resolved, that this Congress while reiterating its firm belief in collective action through the League of Nations as the most effective means of maintaining world peace, nevertheless recognizes the need to render help at this hour to those democratic countries whose independence and integrity is now being challenged; and, be it further resolved, that our Government be urged to cooperate with other peace loving countries of the world in whatever steps are deemed essential to destroy the reign of terror being imposed by Nazi and Fascist dictators and thus remove this menace of international lawlessness and once more bring peace to mankind; and be it further resolved, that we call upon the Prime Minister, Right Hon. Wm. Lyon McKenzie King to immediately convene Parliament in order to make known the policy of Canada to its people and to the world.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES:--Boycott Committee, delegate Shearer reported that the Committee were going to speed up their activities during the winter months and requested affiliated Unions to get behind their activities.

REPORTS OF UNIONS: -- Bakers 468 -- Delegate Humphreys reported that they had resigned their agreements with Hastings Bakery; Mother Hubbard Bakery; Canadian Bakeries; McGavin's Limited; Cowan Dodson; Robertsons Bakery Ltd and Campbell Bakery.

Hotel & Rest. Empl. 28-del. Gateman reported the Province Cafe, Main St. had been signed up and thanked delegates Griffin and Stewart and members of Division 101 for assistance rednered. Also reported they are holding a dance on October 6th in the Palomar Ballroom and that refreshments would be provided.

Typographical 226--delegate Holland reported that following negotiations with the Job printing shops they have signed up on the basis of a 40 hour week at \$1.00 per hour which is 8 and 4 cent increase

to a number of the employees.

Railway Carmen 58-Delegate Warde reported more men employed as a result of the increased wheat shipments.

Carpenters 452-del. Wilson reported they have signed up with the Contractor's an agreement for 90¢ per hour. Also that the 75¢ minimum

set up by the Government was not the Union scale.

B.C. Coast District Council—delegate Lundgren reported on the Blubber Bay situation and that the Attorney General had been agreeable to an investigation into Police interference but that the Premier had overruled it.

NEW BUSINESS: -- Del. Humphreys moved that the question of the Rolling Pin Bakery be referred to the Grievance Committee with Power to Act. "Garried."

QUESTION BY MEMBERS: --Question was asked as to why Local 28 was not permitted to state its case re Good Eats Cafe. President Jamieson replied.

GOOD AND WELFARE: -- Secretary reported on the I.L.O. conference at Geneva and the work carried on by that organization. "Moved, seconded and carried that the report be accepted and a vote of thanks extended to the Secretary.

tion and Canada's position. "On motion received and filed."
(2) B.C.Coast District Council, I.W.A. notifying that they are calling a defense meeting Friday, Oct. 7th at 130 W. Hastings St. and asking delegates to attend. Also a resolution from the Pile Drivers Local 2404 requesting an investigation by the Provincial Govt. into the whole question of the Blubber Bay strike, the actions of the Company and Provincial Police. "On motion received, the subject matter endorsed and referred to the Executive to take up with the Provincial

(3) Housewives' League, British Columbia, requesting the privilege of sending a speaker to the Council to explain Bill 89. "On motion received and a speaker invited to address the next meeting."

(4) B.C. Federation on Unemployment setting out that they are not a dual organization to this Council. That they have not accepted affiliation from Unions affiliated with the Canadian Federation of Labour and that they are not associated with any political party. That they have no connection with the C.C.F. Economic Conference. "On motion received and noted."

Executive reported having reviewed the question of Parking Meters in this city and particularly the opinions of such organizations as Teamsters and Taxi Drivers and others who constantly use the City streets and recommended that the resolution as passed at the previous meeting condemning Parking Meters be rescinded and further consideration given to the question.

Following discussion on this question later in the evening, it was moved, seconded and carried that this matter be laid over to be

brought up at the next meeting.

Dr. Davidson, Executive Director Vancouver Welfare Federation addressed the Council on the work of the Welfare Federation and went into many details of their activities. Following the address it was moved, seconded and carried that a committee of five be appointed by the Executive to investigate and report back to the Council.

Dr. Barton, President Federated Ratepayers Assoc. addressed the Council on the necessity of cleaning up the False Creek area where a deplorable condition of open sewers exists, the idea being to put in city park and playgrounds. "On motion it was decided that we reiterate our stand on the question of cleaning up False Creek.

Mr. L.O. Thomas of the Vancouver Symphony Society addressed the Council on the work of the Symphony Society. That they are giving six concerts in the Orpheum Theatre, the price of admission being 25 cents to \$200. He pointed out that now the prices have been reduced that people should take advantage of the opportunity offered. The address was received with interest and delegates requested to note.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS & COMMITTEES: -- Organizing Committee -- Delegate C.Stewart reported having attended a meeting of the Furniture Wkrs. at which the officers and members were obligated. <u>Civic Employees 25</u>—Delegate Ashton reported that there is a proposal to change the Superanuation Act as affecting Civic Employees and to raise the voluntary and compulsory qualifying ages.

Milksalesmen 464—Delegate Showler reported that the Empress Dairy is still on the Non Patronage list. Also reported that at their last meeting they had passed a resolution against the sale of raw milk unless the dairy is inspected daily by the City. Also that they are in favor of the Better Business Bureau.

Hospital Employees -- (Civic Empl. 28.) delegate reported that the Board of Directors of the Vancouver General Hospital had agreed to pay the award as recommended by the Arbitration Board.

Retail Clerks 279-Delegate Maxwell reported that the stores controlled by Ray Esslinger have been put into a Company Union. These stores sell groceries, meats, clothing, etc. and include Superior Meat Market, Ideal market, Rainier market, Grand Union Market, Cash and Carry, B.C. Public Market.

In addition their membership have gone on record as being in favor of Union made goods and shops. Further they have endorsed the resolution of the Milkdrivers & Dairy Employees Local 464.

Also a copy of the letter sent by the Council Secretary thanking them for the action taken and with reference to the Council's position on the Commodities Retail Sales Act. "On motion received and action of

Secretary in sending same endorsed." (4) Trades & Labor Council, Port Arthur, Ontario, enclosing a letter dealing with the need of maintaining autonomy of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada as the supreme legislative body in Canada and also enclosing a resolution dealing with this and kindred questions. Executive recommended that the communication be received, the resolution endorsed and sent out to affiliated Unions requesting their endorsation. A great deal of discussion arose on the question and an amendment was made that the question be referred to Local Unions for their consideration and that their delegates be instructed to report the views of their Local at the next meeting of this Council. "On a show of hands vote the amendment lost and the motion was then carried. Delegates Showler, Holland and Smith wished to be recorded as voting against the motion. (NOTE): A copy of the circular letter and resolu-

tion are enclosed. (5) Vancouver City Council requesting this Council to express an opinion with regard to the proposal to make the first Mon ay in August a Civic holiday. Moved, seconded and carried that this Council go on record as being in favor of the holiday at the same time requesting the City Council to make strong recommendations to business concerns and factories that would recognize the holiday to have the workers paid for that day."

(6) Lower Mainland Dairy Products Board acknowledging receipt of communication requesting that a labor representative be placed on the Board and stating that this would be dealt with at their next meeting. " On motion received and noted."

(7) Mr. M.S.Reynolds, informing the Council that the firm of Chrystal & Co. Vancouver had obtained an order from the Federal Government to make 300 "Ditty" boxes for the Conadian Navy and that when the Government supplied the locks and hinges it was found that they were all made in Germany. "On motion secretary was instructed to communicate with the proper authorities and to state that if the information we had received was correct that we deplore such actions particularly in view of the need for employment in Canada.

(8) Victoria Trades & Labor Council enclosing minutes of their meeting held on Nov. 2nd. "On motion received with appreciation and

filed for reference."

(9) Int. office Retail Clerks Protective Assoc., setting out that the Montgomery-Ward and Co. have taken a very antagonistic attitude towards organized Labor in general and their organization in particular. As this Company has branches in the Border cities in the state of Washington. "Communication received and noted."

(10) Montreal Stereotypers & Electrotypers reporting on the unfair attitude of the Herald Publishing Co. of Montreal which company is making all mats sent out by the Dominion news bureau of Montreal. "On motion received and referred to the Allied Printing Trades Council"

Moved, seconded and carried that the report of the Executive as a whole be adopted.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES: -- Grievance Committee, Delegate Hughes reported they had held meetings to consider the question of the Esslinger stores and the request of the Hotel & Restaurant Employees to put the Arctic Club on the "We Do Not Patronize" list and reported progress on both questions. "On motion report received."

Special Committee to investigate publication "Labour Truth" President Jamieson reported having appointed delegates Showler, Arbuckle and Maxwell. Delegate Showler reported they had made a thorough investigation of the publication, the Committee was surprised at some of the people who were advertising in it as it was not in the strict sense of the word a Labor paper. While it was endorsed apparently by the Shipping Federation Company Unions it was pointed out very strongly that the paper was not by any means an authority on Labor questions but was merely the voice of Unions that are owned and controlled by the Shipping Federation.

Committee recommended that this Council insert in the "Personal" columns of the daily Province and Sun, twice a month, an advert. stating that the "Labor Statesman" is the only official organ of this Council. Following further consideration the report of the Committee

was received and endorsed.

Press Committee--Delegate Holland reported that the law suit brought against the Statesman had resulted in the case against the Press Committee being dismissed but that the one bringing suit had been awarded damages against the Editor and at the present time the actual amounts involved were not as yet stated. "On motion report received as progress."

Organizing Committee -- Delegate Chas. Stewart reported they had a meeting last Wednesday evening and had considered the questions of the Boot and Shoe Workers Union now in a very poor condition on account of the opposition received from London Shoe Renew; Woodward Store; Hudson Bay and Spencers. Recommended that the Executive interview Woodwards Store pointing out the discrimination.

That the Organizing Committee had a further meeting arranged for the 7th of December. "On motion report received and the recommendation

REPORTS OF UNIONS: -- Civic Employees 28, Delegate Scribbins reported that last Thursday they had met to celebrate the victory of the Hospital Employees in securing improved wages and conditions as a result of the Arbitration Board which had met on the case and to pay tribute to Secretary Bengough for the assistance he had given to the organization

Machinists 692, delegate Arbuckle reported that they had signed up a closed shop agreement covering Machinists Fitters, Specialists and Helpers with the Burrard Dry Dock and hoped to report on more firms be-

ing signed up in the near future.

Bakers, delegate Humphreys reported that they had renewed their Nanaimo agreement with a five cent increase of wages. Also that they had a Board and had accepted the majority award but that the Company had not. As a result a strike had been called Friday and they were now picketting the Woman's Bakery and stores. That the men desire a signed Agreement, and would not go back until same was secured. It was also reported that they are in need of financial assistance.

Milkdrivers 464, delegate Showler reported they had signed up the Empress Dairy. Also thanked the Secretary of the Upholsterers Union for the assistance he had rendered to their Local. Further reported that the Crystal Dairy and the Jersey Farms Dairy are still on the "We Do Not Patronize" list. Also that they are holding a Dance on Wednesday, December 7th in the Moose Hall and invited delegates to attend. Refreshments will be served by members of Local 28.

NEW BUSINESS: -- Moved, seconded and carried that the Empress Dairy be taken off the "We Do Not Patronize" list.

Delegate Arbuckle, Machinists 692 introduced the question of the six month sentence which had been passed recently on Mrs. Rose who had been convicted of manslaughter arising out of a street accident. He pointed out that one of her sons is a member of the Machinists' Union and that Mrs. Rose had already suffered a great deal. It was moved, seconded and carried that this Council send a letter to the Minister of Justice asking for clemency in this case.

Delegate Humphreys moved that the question of placing the Woman's Bakery on the "We Do Not Patronize" list be referred to the Grievance Committee with Power to act. The question of the Montreal Bakery was reintroduced by Delegate Showler and a previous motion to refer to the Grievance Committee to be rescinded. "On motion carried."

Moved, seconded and carried that the question of placing the Montreal Bakery on the "We Do Not Patronize" list be referred to the Grievance Committee with power to act.

Delegate C. Stewart introduced the following resolution: That this Trades and Labor Council instruct its secretary to write to the German Consul in Vancouver protesting the persecution of the Jewish people and that a resolution be sent to Prime Minister MacKenzie King petitioning the Canadian Government to protest against the pogroms and request that all relations to broken off with a country that has reverted to barbarism and that we ask all locals to take similar action. "On motion carried."

Meeting adjourned at 9:50 p.m.

Domestic Workers 91, Delegate Mrs. Johnston reported a delegation from the Union, along with the C.C.F., appeared before the Relief Committee of the City Council and that they appreciated the assistance of Ald. Pettipiece and Gutteridge and that they had taken up the question of the Relief office sending out Domestic help at low wages and conditions.

Painters 138, Delegate Smith reported organizing campaign having good success and that a number of the Beer parlors are at present employing their members.

Meatcutters Local 95, Delegate Douglas reported that their enquiry had ended and that the report and recommendations of Judge MoIntosh had been favorable to the Union. He found that the Union had been formed to improve conditions of its members and not for any ulterior motive. Also that their conduct had been good and had recommended to the Company that the men be taken back on a basis of 50 in April, 50 in May and 40 in June. Further recommended that the men have a right to belong to any organization of their own chosing, but that the Manager of the Company and the Business Agent of the Union should be transplanted to other fields.

Further reported that the Union had good support from the Trade Unions and the financial support they had received up to date from all sources was in the neighborhood of \$12.000.00.

Engineers 115, Delegate Flynn reported that they had notified the bosses that the 1931 wage scale would go into effect on April 1st, and that this had resulted in \$1.00 per day increases in many cases. Also that the Local went in favor of taking part in the May Day celebrations.

Musicians 145, Delegate Jamieson reported they are donating an orchestra to the Butchers for a dance to be held in the Trianon Ballroom on May 7th and that members can help those on strike from Burns by patronizing the dance. Further that they had been taking up with the Parks Board, the question of employing Union bands instead of the Boys and cheap bands that had been used and that they had had good support from Bros. MacDonald, MacAulay and Pettipiece in their capacity of Park Commissioners.

Milksalesmen 464, Delegate Showler reported the Park Commissioners had let the milk contract to a Union firm and thanked the Labor members of the Board for their assistance.

Local 94 Meatcutters, New Westminster, delegate reported on the Dance to be held in the Trianon on the 7th and requested all members to help make it a success. Also that they had endorsed the May Day celebrations. Engineers 882, Delegate King reported they had endorsed May Day and that they were endeavoring to raise money to put a float in the parade.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS: -- The question of a speaker for May Day was taken up and delegate Shearer was elected.

NEW BUSINESS: -- Delegate Snowler introduced the question of the Plebiscite being taken on Health Insurance and stating that the Teamsters locals have endorsed the question of Health Insurance 100% and introduced the following resolution:

whereas the Government of the province of British Columbia is submitting a plebiscite to the Citizens on June lat, 1937, asking their approval of the principle of Health Insurance, and

Whereas the Trade Union Movement has for many years asked for this legislation, and

whereas if this plebiscite fails to carry by a majority of the votes of our citizens, the whole principle of Health Insurance will be set back for many years,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED That this Council circulate all Labor Unions in this Province and ask their cooperation in circulating all their members and their friends to get out and vote for the plebiscite on Health Insurance.

"On motion endorsed."

Moved, seconded and carried that the Executive be authorized to select suitable speakers to lay before the public our position on Health Insurance and also to take the necessary steps to secure radio

Delegate Maskell of the Inland Boatmen's Union brought up the question of the dance being held on behalf of the "Policy Committee" of the Maritime Workers and it was explained by the Delegate from the I.L.A. that they were not in favor of the Committee. The Secretary of the Council pointed out that some of the organizations in the Committee were not affiliated. On the same being put to a vote, the motion was lost, 33 voting to endorse the Dance and 47 against.

The question of the Engineers at McGavin's Bakery wasreferred to the Grievance Committee. Moved, seconded and carried that the Council request the Health Authorities to change the bylaw dealing with the pick-up of stale bread and cakes or that the bylaw be more rigid-

On motion question of the corssing at Beatty and Pender 3treets be taken up with the City Traffic Department.

Delegate Showler stated that he would take this up with the Traffic Safety Council.

Delegate Monro introduced a resolution dealing with the strike of the employees at the Cancial Motors, Oshawa and condemning the unwarranted interference of Premier Hepburn of Cnt. Instead of using his official position for the purpose of bringing about a peaceful settlement he had sent out violent ultimatums. "On motion endorsed."

Delegate George Bengough, requested to know regarding the confiliation of the Council to the Youth Congress as the afpaid and the delegate to the Congress retained.

Meeting adjourned at 10 p.m.

(9) Meatcutters Local 95 in which they officially set out the position of the Union in face of the fact of 25 who had returned to work at Burns Company and that they still have over 100 members still out on strike and still in need of financial assistance.

(10) Telegram Deep Sea Fishermen's Union, Prince Rupert in which they set out that a representative of the Burns Company in that City claims that a settlement has been made with the Burns employees and that the Company is now fair. Also a wire sent by the Secretary of this Council in which it is stated that a few employees made a settlement with the Company but that the imajority were still on strike and the products of the Company still on the Unfair list and should there be any change in the situation they will be officially notified by this Council. "On motion received and action of Secretary endorsed."

(11) Thos. E. Burke, Gen. office Int. Assoc. Plumbers & Steam-fitters; Bro. Railway Carmen Vancouver 65; Hon. Geo.S. Pearson, Minister of Labor Victoria; Mr. Adam Bell, Deputy Min. Labor, Vic; Dr. Allon Peebles, Chairman Health Ins. Commission; Mr. F.E. Harrison, West. Rep. Dept. of Labor; Meatcutters 95 and other Local Unions, all expressing regret for the great loss sustained by this Council and the Labor Movement generally by the death of Pres. Cclin McDonald and extending sincere sympathies and condolences to his family. "Moved, adopted."

REPORTS OF UNIONS:

Hotel & Restaurant Empl., del. Stewart reported that supplementary to the report made at the last meeting, Mr. Walker was continuing some of the employers, particularly Scott's Cafe, on Granvillest., and that the matter was being taken up. Also that they had signed up the Golden Gate Cafe and the Stella Cafe on Main Street.

Tailors Local 178, Delegate reported that at their last meeting they had donated a further Twenty-five dollars to Local 95.

Projectionists 348, Delegates Pollock and Williamson reported that their Local had succeeded in organizing the employees at the Film Exchange and that an application was being made for a Charter. Also reported regarding efforts which have been made by the theatre owners to change the regulations whereby they could employ one man and a boy in place of two men. That this matter was now being taken up before a Commission and that it was expected that in the interests of public safety that there would be no change in such regulations.

Meatcutters Local 95, delegate Douglas reported that they had sent in an agreement last week to the Manager of Burns Co., Mr. williamson, but that he had refused to entertain any agreement or recognize the Union in any way. Further reported that the Sterling markets

Truck Drivers Local 31, Delegate Atkinson reported that they are still signing up the teaming firms and that Chess Bros. and wells Cartage had signed up during the week.

Machinists 692-Delegate Marshall reported that they were making satisfactory progress in their organizing drive and expect to reach 100% organization in the near future.

Musicians 145-Delegate Fitzgerald reported that they had moved their offices to 732 Seymour St. Further that they are negotiating with the City Parks for bands this summer.

Bakers 468-Delegate Brydson reported that they are having trouble with the smaller shops selling bread at 5¢ per loaf. This competition makes it very difficult for the Union firms to pay Union wages and recognize Union conditions.

Painters Local 138, Delegate Smith reported their organizing drive progressing, 50 members added last month. Also that the Belmont, Broadway and the Burrard were having work done under Union conditions.

Railway Carmen 55-Delegate Shearer reported that they are now working on a 40-hour week.

Milksalesmen 464-Delegate Blackman reported that they are endeavoring to increase their membership & that members could help if they would recognize the need of patronizing only Union milksalesmen

Barbers Local 120--Delegate Herrett reported that as a result of Trade Union members requesting the Shop Card, that they were signing up some new shops and he particularly asked the members in New Westminster to take up with their barber, the need of signing up for a Union Card.

Meatcutters Local 94, New Westminster reported they are still raising money for Local 95 and they are having a picnic on July 11th to Bowen Island, tickets are \$1.00 for adults & 50¢ for children.

MEW BUSINESS: -- On motion of Delegate Chas. Stewart, Div. 101, the Gouncil went on record as recommending to affiliated Locals that the children's Summer Camp at Orlohma Beach is worthy of support.

QUESTIONS BY MEMBERS: -- Teamsters asked if the Carpenters were doing work at the Vancouver Brewery.

Delegate King asked regarding the Blacksmiths at McGavin's Bakery. Delegate Brydson replied.

GOOD AND VELFAPE: -- pelegate Fordyce reported that efforts were being made to cut down on the stone work on the lst Narrows Bridge and substitute concrete for granite. Secretary pointed out how the original understanding that was made with the Company was that members of affiliated Unions would be employed on all work, but since haven't be bridge franchise the Company had not recognized verbal agreements made. Moved, seconded and carried that a delegation appear before the City Council to be arranged by the Secretary.

It was reported that the President of the Apprenticeship Council made some statements regarding a shortage of mechanics. "On and take action.

Secretary outlined the position of the men still out on strike from the Burns Company and pointed out the need of members protesting to stores which they patronize which are handling the Burns products that these goods are Unfair. Bro. Pettipiece, a member of the Typographical Union and member of the City Council, was invited to the platform and spoke a few gates that he stood ready and willing to help this Council at all

Brother Dietrich, organizer for the I.L.A. addressed the Council stating that he had been sent up here to reorganize the I.L.A. and proposed to set up a sub district Council in this District and bers.

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Brother Howard White, Int. Organizer of the International Brotherhood of Pulp and Sulphite and Paper Mill Workers reported on his ganization had been attained. Also reported that there was 600 signed up in Ocean Falls and that 500 further applications had been sent up there. That 400 applications had been sent in to Port Alice taking a plebiscite at the New Westminster Paper mills as to whether or not they wanted to join the Union.

Neelands, representing the Allied Printing Trades Council.

This delegation interviewed the Minister of Labor in Victoria and as a result they did get changes made, making the Bill more compatible to the Trade Unions. "On motion the report was received and actions

of the delegation endorsed."

Secretary further reported that among other things, Brother Youhill, President of the Trades and Labor Council in Victoria, was quoted in the papers as publicly stating that Labor representatives from Vancouver had endeavored only to put through a Bill of their own and that the Bill now brought in by the Government was a Magna Charta for Labor.

It was moved, seconded and carried unanimously that the statements of Pres. Youhill of Victoria be repudiated by this Council as the Bill was not by any means the Magna Charta of Labor and the Labor representatives referred to had endeavored to get only the Congress Bill enac-

Moved, seconded and carried that the report of the Executive as a whole be adopted.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES: -- Delegate Showler reported for the Traffic Safety Council that a change had been made in the Automobile Act whereby the ultimate owner of the car is liable for automobile accidents. As this is something that we have been requesting for many years, particularly in relation to U-Drive cars, the report was received with appreciation.

Committee appointed to consider the question of a banquet, Delegate W. Stewart reported they had considered the question and recommended that the banquet be held on the third Tuesday in January and that delegates be sent tickets at \$1.50 each. Following discussion the report of the Committee was received and endorsed."

Also expressed appreciation to delegates Showler and Bengough and Brother Keefe of Machinists 182 who had assisted at the meeting.

Railway Carmen Port Mann Lodge 280 -- reported they had received a semi official announcement that there was a pending 20% layoff. Retail Clerks--Delegate Maxwell expressed appreciation to the Organizing Committee, Delegates C. Stewart, A. Fordyce, W. Stewart, W. Gatemen, J. Humphreys and King of Local 151 who had assisted in organizing Retail clerks. Two meetings had been held and about 240 employees of the Piggly Wiggly and Safeway had signed up. This comprises 98% of the total employees. That they had drafted an agreement to submit to the Company with whom they desire to cooperate. Also asked members to suggest to their wives to drop a kindly word to the employees of these stores.

Railway Carmen 58-Delegate Warde reported that the Federated Railway Trades are holding a convention here in May. That the Joint Board of the Railway Carmen will be meeting here from the 2nd to 9th

Div. 101 -- Delegate Griffin thanked the members of the Executive who attended the City Council meeting to combat the introduction of the One-man street cars.

Truek Drivers 31 -- Del. Atkinson reported that the Associated Transfer; 300 Transfer and the Ideal Messengers had signed up. Sign Writers 726-reported that they approved the 1¢ increase in Per Capita. Also that since the Secretary had written the Imperial

Tobacco Co., the United Cigar Stores had decided to get their work donw on a 100% Union basis.

Hotel & Restaurant Local 28-Delegate Gateman reported that the White Lunch, Eden Cafe and the Waldorf Cafes are particularly antagonistic to the Trade Union Movement. Delegates and members are requested to take particular note.

Butchers 95 -- Del. Douglas called attention to the delegates that the trouble is not settled at Burns and Company and that their goods are still on the "Unfair" list. Also that they request the Executive to devise ways and means to organize the Meat industry.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS: -- Delegate C. Stewart reported that the question of the statements of Mr. Reid, M.P., and Brother Rolley, Secretary of the B.C. Fishermen's Protective Association had been discussed at length in the Executive and while the Executive felt that this should

not be presented in the form of a motion that a statement should be made regarding the policy of the Council on the Japanese question. It should be distinctly understood that the Boycott of Japanese and Fascist goods is not intended in any way to be construed into a boycott against Japanese residents here. The matter of driving the Japanese Fishermen off the Fraser River and refusing to patronize Japanese stores is not the policy of this Council. The Boycott is against Imperialism in Japan-against the purchase of good from Japan and against the shipment of War material to Japan.

NEW BUSINESS: -- Moved by Delegate W. Stewart and seconded that this Council disassociate itself from the Anti Oriental prejudice being stirred up by the Daily Press in this City and using the Boycott to foster ratial hatred. "On a show of hands vote 66 voted for and 43

Moved, seconded and carried that this Council reiterate its previous stand as being opposed to Anti Oriental Ratial Prejudice campaign as being carried on by some in this City.

Moved, seconded and carried that this Council organize a Trade Union class, the Executive to bring about its formation.

Moved by Delegate Munro, seconded and carried that credentials be given to Local 95 Meatcutters to solicit loans from affiliated Unions for organizing purposes.

Moved by Delegate Shearer, seconded and carried that the Council endorse the recommendations of the Boycott Committee; that the question of the Mass Pickett be taken up with affiliated Unions to report back at the next meeting.

Moved, seconded and carried that we endorse the drawing up of a booklet on "How and Why to Boycott Goods made in Japan".

Moved, seconded and carried that the Boycott Committee be given the power to call a meeting of Wives and daughters of Trade Union members to form a Ladies Auxiliary.

Moved, seconded and carried that credentials be given to members

of the Boycott Committee to address affiliated Unions.

Moved, seconded and carried that the Trades & Labor Congress be asked to immediately put into operation an Organizing Dept. to organize the Packing House industry throughout Canada.

C. are the same companies which are operating in Quebec and Ontario. In the East they claim they are unable to pay higher wages on account of the cheap Oriental Labor in the West.

In the West they claim they are unable to pay better wages because of the cheap labor in Quebec. This situation is to be watched by the Executive when being dealt with by the Provincial Minimum Wage Board.

Delegate R. MacAulay pointed out the danger of splits and divisions in the Labor Movement, at this time when there is every need of the working class getting together to offset the introduction of Fascism and suggested that the Council Executive bring in a brief on a suggested policy.

(3) Mr. Jock Ness, requesting financial assistance to provide transportation to the Yukon. "On motion received and referred to Meatcutters Local 95."

(4) Dept. Trade and Industries, Victoria, extending an invitation to attend a meeting being held by the Hon. W.G.Asselstine to get views on the canned foods business and the threatened importation of such goods from Eastern Canada. "On motion invitation accepted and the President and Secretary to attend."

"On motion credentials received and those present obligated."

Executive reported on meeting held the same evening. Members present E.Smith, D.Macpherson, B.Showler, P.Bengough, C. Stewart, T. Holland and E.A.Jamieson.

(1) General Truck Drivers Union, Powell River Branch, requesting that the Westview Dairy be placed on the "We Do Not Patronize" list as they had been unable to negotiate with this Company and that they were very antagonistic. "On motion received and the request to be taken up with the Pulp and Sulphite and Paper Makers Unions of Powell River and concurred in."

(2) Victoria Trades & Labor Council minutes of their meeting of April 6th. "On motion received and filed for reference."

(3) Printing Pressmen 69 reporting that they are in favor of the 1-cent increase in Per Capita tax. "On motion received and noted (4) Mr. James Tester of the Workers' Cooperative of New Ontario reporting that the salesmen for Burns and Co. are intensely worried that the Co-op handles a very high percentage of the meat business in New Ontario. Also that other stores are cutting down on Burns products. The salesmen informed them that matters were being straightened out in B. C. Secretary of the Council replied setting out that the Burns Products were still on the "We Do Not Patronize" list and that to date no adjustment had been made. Secretary further reported that under the Financial report of the Burns Company, under the heading of "Burns and Co. Income Shows Big Decline". The receipts for 1937 were \$27,843 as against \$195,385 in 1936. Labor trouble and wage increases were given as the reasons reponsible for the decline according to the report of the Company.

Moved, seconded and carried that the correspondence be received, the action of the Secretary endorsed and the financial report of the Burns Company received with appreciation.

(5) Bro. Chas. A. Watson, Secretary-Treasurer Local S-18 Fire Fighters notifying that they had procured the reinstatement of Burneby B.C. Fire Fighters Local 323, that the Charter would be presented at an early date and they will then be making application for affiliated to this Council. "On motion received and noted."

(6) Trades and Labor Congress of Canada acknowledging receipt of Per Capita tax and extending good wishes to the delegates. "On

(7) Telegram sent by Secretary to the Pres. of the Can. Nat. Pailways, protesting the letting of contracts to firms in the East when so many competent mechanics are unemployed here. Also Mr. Hungerford's wire replying stating that the contract for kitchen equipment had been let to the lowest tenderer and that Local firms

would have every opportunity to quote on a competetive basis for other installations. "On motion received and left in the hands of the

Executive to take up further."

(8) Correspondence between the Secty. and the David Neon Ltd. Secretary reported having drawn up an agreement, copies of which had been accepted by the Company for the purpose of attaching their seal but had not been returned. As a result a registered letter had been sent to the Company notifying them that the documents received from this Council were null and void. "On motion received and the action of the Secretary endorsed."

(9) Hotel & Restaurant Empl. 28, regarding the dispute at the Chanticleer Lunch which had been referred to a conciliation commissioner under the Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act. As this dispute arose during a Christmas rush the unwarranted delay on the part of the Government had been entirely favorable to the Management. That they were in favor of amending or appealing the Act. Secretary reported that the Provincial Executive of the Trades & Labor Congress of Canada had written for an interview with the Premier to secure a definite interpretation of the Act, believing that the interpretation of the Minister of Labor is at variance with the desires of the Govt. The position taken by the Minister of Labour is one of refusing to recognize established Trade Unions. "Moved, seconded and carried that the report of the Executive as a whole be adopted."

REPORTS OF OFFICERS & COMMITTEES:--

Secretary reported having attended with the President, a meeting called by the Prov. Minister of Trade & Industry to consider the question of the importation of canned goods from the East and that tentative arrangements had been arrived at to keep Eastern Products out of the B.C.Market. "On motion received."

Boycott Committee -- Delegate Shearer reported that the Committee had met since the last meeting and were recommending and would introduce a motion under New Business, that a special meeting of the Council be held on April 26th at 8 p.m. "On motion report received."

REPORTS OF UNIONS:-

Butchers Local 94 -- Delegate Hughes reported that they are endeavoring to meet the Swift Canadian Company for the purpose of getting the Company to recognize the right of collective bargaining and to recognize their Union as a bargaining agent.

Teamsters Local 31 -- Delegate Atkinson reported the North West Messengers and Skillings Transfer had been signed up. They are also requesting that the Leslie Coal Company be placed on the "Unfair"

list.

Painters 138-Delegate Smith reported that his Local is requesting that Happyland at Hastings Park be placed on the Non Patronage list as they are getting painting and sign writing done under Non Union conditions.

Milksalesmen 464 -- Delegate Showler reported that they are en-

deavoring to organize the National Dairies.

Office Employees -- Del. MacDonald reported that they were against the 1-cent increase in Per Capita. Also wished to be recorded as resenting the actions of Engineers Local 882 who had taken it on themselves to write to the Office Employees' headquarters desiring information re forming a Union and asking that an organizer be sent in, all of which had been done without consulting the officers of the affiliated Union.

Barbers 120 -- Del. Herrett reported that they had signed up the Barber Shop at 611 Smithe Street and at 632 Howe Street and also the barber shop at Union Bay, B.C. Further reported that a pamphlet was being put out dealing with the barbering trade and the Union wished to state that they are in no way connected with this publication.

Carpenters 452 -- Delegate Page reported that members were not patronizing the Rio Theatre and as a result the prices at the theatre

had been lowered in anendeavor to get patronage.

Civic Employees 25-Del. Ashton reported they were endeavoring to get a five-cent increase with an additional weeks holiday. They also wished to correct the misleading statements that had been made that the Civic Employees had received 20% increase, because no increase of wages had made to the outside men.

Railway Carmen 58 -- Delegate Warde reported that they are busy getting ready for the Division 4 and Carmen's convention. That they are inviting Bro. Tallon, Pres. of Div. 4; Bro. Bengough from the Trades & Labor Congress of Canada and Bro. Jamieson representing this Council. Also that they were presenting 25-year membership badges to 19 of their members on this occasion.

Jewelry Workers 42 -- Delegate Hawken reported that they are endeavoring to organize the Jewelry Workers on the Pacific Coast and also that the local is opposed to the ruling given by the President of this Council on the question of May Day at the last meeting.

Projectionists 348-Del. Woolridge reported the strike at Alberni had been satisfactorily settled and that the Capitol theatre there was now operating on a Union basis. Also complimented the Kitsilano Boy's Band who had refused to play at this theatre while it was non Union and instead had played at the opposition house which operated on a Union

Railway Carmen 280-Delegate reported that they are also getting ready for the Div. 4 and Carmens' convention. Also that they are in

favor of the Boycott Committee.

Domestic Workers 91 -- Del. Dougan reported they had a Committee set up of representative citizens to consider the wages and working conditions of those in Domestic service. Also dealt with the C.I.O. question which is an issue of paramount importance throughout the United States. Bro. Frey pointed out that the C.I.O. Committee was started as a minority group in the A.F. of L. in opposition to the majority vote in a democratic organization. Further reported on the increase of membership which had been secured by the A. F. of L. during the last few months.

The address was both interesting and instructive and was received with appreciation and applause by the delegates.

Humphreys, Bakers 468 introduced the question of the Conciliation and Arbitration Act which was undoubtedly being used by the Employers to endeavor to get away from existing agreements and that it was quite evident they are taking full advantage of the adverse interpretations being placed on the Act by the Minister.

QUESTIONS BY MEMBERS:--

Question was raised regarding the policy of the Council on Political questions. Chairman asked Bro. Tallon, Secty-Treas. of the Congress for his views on the question. Del. Tallon advised the delegates to keep their political views outside of the Council business as much

Moved, seconded and carried that this Trades & Labor Council is in favor of an embargo on shipments of war material to Spain and Japan.

GOOD AND WELFARE: -- Del. Showler called attention of the delegates to the interpretation placed on the Labour and Conciliation Act by the Minister of Labour, which was resulting in the Unions being entirely ignored even where they have 100% organization and that undoubtedly the Hon. Mr. Pearson's interpretations are in favor of the employers in many instances. That employers are taking full advantage of the situation. Also pointed out that the Women's bakery have stated that they did not wish to continue existing agreements. That the matter has been taken up by the Prov. Dept. of Labour and that the forms called for the signatures of employees.

The question of holding meetings and other methodsof combatting the particularly adverse features of the legislation were considered and it was decided on motion to postpone such actions until after the Provincial Executive of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada had a meeting with the Government.

Govt. for their total lack of sympathy in handling this problem and asks that an impartial commission similar in nature to the one which investigated the Penitentiary situation in the Dominion, be immediately appointed to investigate and place the blame for the violence upon the responsible

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a Public Works program be instituted immediately and that in the interim, relief be granted to the unemployed boys, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be sent to the responsible parties mentioned herein and to all affiliated Trades and Labor Councils in the Dominion of Canada.

In his address he stated that some of the property damage which occured was not done by his membership but was being done by hoodlums who took advantage of the situation to create a disturbance and that there was a strong suspicion that "Agent Provocateurs" were responsible for the damage at mass gatherings. Mr. Campbell's address was very well received.

REPORTS OF UNIONS: -- Civic Employees reported all employees in the cemetery now members of their local. That the employees at the Hospital were now applying for a board of conciliation. That the Vancouver Exhibition Board had refused to negotiate a wage scale increas

B.C. Coast Council reported their membership being intimidated at Port Alberni and that the Minister of Labor had refused to appoint a conciliator and that some 70 men had been discriminated. Blubber Bay importing Non Union workers.

Local 279 Retail Employees reported that the Superior Stores had signed up a closed shop agreement. Also that efforts had been made to organize the shoe men but owing to intimidation they had voted against an Agreement.

Butchers 94 reported efforts were now being made to negotiate with Swifts. Men now taking a plant vote as to what organization they wished to belong.

Local 348 Projectionists thanked the various Locals affiliated

with the Council for their support.

Carmen Lodge 280 reported they were laying plans to combat the efforts for the amalgamation of the railroads.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS & COMMITTEES: -- Grievance Committee -- Delegate Macpherson reported unable to reach an agreement with the Empress Dairies and it was therefore recommended that this Company be placed on the "We Do Not Patronize" list as requested by the Milksalesmen's Union. "On motion concurred in." Delegate also reported of an interview with the Exhibition Board regarding the rate of wages being paid to their employees and that as a result of the representations made by the grievance Committee the Board had agreed to raise the rate of wages from 53-1/4 to 57-5/8 cents per hour. "On motion the report received in appreciation."

Organizing Committee: -- Delegate C. Stewart reported that a representative of the International Pulp & Sulphite employees had been in the City in an endeavor to organize the National Paper Box Co., 163 W. 3rd Ave., but that the Company had offset the efforts made by

setting up a Company Union.

It was moved by delegate Munro that the representative of the Blubber May strikers be given ten minutes and same being carried the Secretary of the Blubber Bay local outlined what had taken place. That they had complied with the Arbitration Act and had carried on for six months and that the final wage was acceptable to the men but the Company had refused. It was also reported that men and their families were being evicted from the Company houses and that 13 of the men are facing trial. Same being received with interest and referred to the Local Unions.

REPORTS OF UNIONS: --

Meatoutters 94--delegate Hughes reported that they had held a meeting to consider the question of the Assembley Plant Union and Local 94 and had voted 71% for having their own Union. Del. Hughes also reported that the Swift Co. were at least more fair to organized Labor than any of the other companies.

<u>Milksalesmen 464-Del.</u> Showler reported that the Boilermakers had

a picnic and had purchased non-union milk supplies.

Painters 138-Del. Smith reported their cooperation with the Building Trades Council and that they had eliminated the spraying machine on work at the Canadian National Hotel. Also that he had been successful in organizing a Local and installing a charter with the Automobile Painters.

Sheet Metal Wkrs. 280-Del. Macpherson called attention that the time for repairing furnaces had arrived and reminded delegates and members to insist on the work being done in a Union shop.

Hotel & Rest. Empl. 28-Del. Gateman reported that the Georgia and Vancouver Hotels had signed an Agreement for a 5% increase in wages and Banquet money, also that all the restaurants with which they had Agreements had resigned with the exception of the Trocadero Cafe.

Bakers 468-Del. Humphreys reported they are holding a pionic at Newcastle Island on August 20th. Also that they had an arbitration board and the Board had recommended a closed shop and other gains in conditions. Also thanked President Jamieson for assistance given in adjusting a difficulty at the Woman's Bakery.

Railway Carmen -- Delegate Shearer reported they are holding a second annual smoker on Fri. Aug. 12th at 8:30 at the Legion Hall,

Seymour Street.

Cannery Wkrs. 105-Del. Jackson reported they had submitted a brief to the minimum wage Board recommending improved regulations in the Canning industry and that some gain had resulted from the interview. Also thanked Secretary Bengough for his assistance.

Carpenters 452-Del. Wilson reported they had a strike on some of the larger uptown jobs, and that an Arbitration Board had been set up and a scale of wages set at 90 cents instead of 80 cents as the employ-

ers were endeavoring to pay.

Meatcutters 95 Del. Douglas reported the Canada Packers were not very favorable to organized Labor and that in his opinion Swift Co. were the best of any of the Packing Companies.

Jewelry Wkrs -- Del. reported it is not possible to get the Union

Label on any jewelry work in Vancouver.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS: (Committees appointed)

Organizing Committee: Del. C.Stewart elected Chairman. Delegates appointed: Bengough, W. Stewart, Maxwell, Macaulay.

Grievance Committee: Del. Macpherson elected Chairman. Delegates

Bengough, Showler, Pritchard, Cowper appointed.

Press Committee: Del. T. Holland elected Chairman. Appointed,

Bengough, Gouthro, Showler, Cowper.

ELECTION OF DELEGATES TO CONGRESS CONVENTION:

Delegates E. A. Jamieson, D. Macpherson, W. Stewart nominated. Delegate Jamieson receiving 75; delegate Macpherson 48 and delegate W. Stewart 78. Delegates Stewart and Jamieson elected.

Question of financing delegates to the Convention was suggested that Local Unions not sending delegates themselves could contribute

in sending delegates from the Council.

Audit Committee, delegates R.H. Neelands, J. Rankin and R. Atkinson appointed.

NEW BUSINESS: --

On motion of del. Gateman the question of placing the Trocadero Cafe on the "We Do Not Patronize" list of the Council for refusing to sign an Agreement was "On motion referred to the Grievance Committee". On motion of Del. Showler that the legislative committee consider some changes in the bail situation in the City Police station. Delegate Showler pointed out that Civic Employees are collecting \$5.00 for making out such Bond. "On motion carried."

QUESTIONS BY MEMBERS:

Del. Hughes asked regarding the Conciliation Act and the report of the Committee on same. Pres. Jamieson replied that the Committee would report next meeting.

Question was asked regarding the Butchers & Meatoutters in Chain

stores.

Question was asked regarding the Council issuing a book on Union Label firms.

Pres. asked delegates from the Jewelry workers if they are Union members in O.B.Allan's. Del. replied they had Union men but it is not

a Union shop and cannot supply the Label.

Relief Project Workers thanking the Council for the support and pointed out that the Agreement which had been reached was not entirely satisfactory but they would carry along with it and that what they desire is the Government to implement work and wages promised by setting up bonafide public works.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Secretary give a report on his attending the I.L.O. at the next meeting of the Council.

Minutes of the regular meeting held on Tuesday, August 16th, 1938. Meeting opened at 8:15 p.m. President Jamieson in the Chair. Minutes of the previous meeting were adopted as mailed.

CREDENTIALS: - Engineers 115, for J. McIvor in place of C.McCallum. Machinists 692 -- George Sangster in place of A. Tait. "On motion credentials received and delegates present obligated."

Executive reported on meeting held the same evening. Members present, Holland, Jamieson, Bengough, W. Stewart, C.Stewart, Fordyce and Morrison.

CORRESPONDENCE:

(1) Relief Project Workers Union regarding the arrangement for temporary representation allowed them by the Council which had expired and requesting that they be granted permanent representation. Executive reported having considered the question at length and that the majority recommendation was that this Council adhere to its Constituttion as set out in Section 1 of Article 2, "That this Council shall be composed of such Trade Unions as are eligible according to the constitution of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada and the American Rederation of Labor." The Chair ruled that as the request was in confliction with the Constitution that the question was out of order."

(2) Street Railwaymen Div. 101, enclosing 4 resolutions that have

been endorsed by their Organization:

(a) WHEREAS at the 53rd Convention of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, a resolution proposing the establishment of an Organizational Department of the Congress was endorsed in principal, but so far no definite action in this regard has been taken by the Dominion Executive. and

WHEREAS such a department would facilitate the organization of thousands of workers, and would be a unifying force throughout the

whole Canadian Trade Union Movement,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the 54th Convention of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, assign a sufficient amount of money to care for the operation of such a Department which should be set up without further delay. "On motion received and endorsed."

(b) WHEREAS on the 17th day of June 1936 the democratically elected Government of Spain was attacked by International Fascism in an attempt to rob the Spanish people of their democratic institutions and

WHEREAS the democratic Government of Canada has placed an embargo upon the shipment of War material to the Loyalist Government of Spain when an abundance of war material is transported from this country to the Insurgents through the ports of Portugal,

WE THEREFORE PETITION the 54th Convention of the Trades and Labor Congress to take up with the Federal Government the immediate lifting of the embargo on Loyalist Spain and to stop the shipment of War material to the Insurgents who are the enemies of the Canadian people. "On motion received and endorsed."

(c) WHEREAS at the 52nd and 53rd Conventions of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada the trend was toward a united Trade Union Movement, where craft and industrial unions could be built up side by side, and WHEREAS this policy has been ably carried out in the past two years, thousands of new members being recruited to our Unions by the adoption

of this policy,

THEREFORE we, the members of Division 101 of the Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Railway and Motor Coach employees of America, Vancouver, B. C., petition the 54th Convention of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada to maintain the status quo so that the thousands of workers still unorganized can be drawn into our Trade Union Movement,

WE FURTHER COMMEND the Dominion Executive of the Trades and Labor Congress for ably carrying out the decisions of the 52nd and 53rd conventions and we trust that no obstacles will be allowed in the future, as in the past, to interfere with a united Canadian Trade Union

Mo vement.

Executive recommended nonconcurrence in this resolution. Following discussion on the question, it was moved and seconded in amendment that this resolution be referred back to Division 101. "On a showof-hands vote, 47 voted to refer back and 62 against." Amendment lost.

It was moved, seconded and carried that we concur in the resolution. (Del. Atkinson, Truck Drivers, wished to be recorded as voting against this resolution.)

(d) BE IT RESOLVED that the 54th Convention of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, again go on record as being opposed to the operation of One-Man Street cars, or One Man busses, as same are a menace to the operators, and a danger to the travelling public and that the Congress petition the Federal Government to make illegal the operation of One Man Street Cars or One Man busses on the streets of our cities. "On motion received and endorsed."

(3) Hotel & Restaurant Empl. 28, submitting a resolution as passed by Local 28 that the condemnation of the infamous Padlock Law as passed by the Duplessis government be again reiterated and the Dom. Govt. asked to immediately have the validity of this law tested in Court. That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the 54th Convention of the Trades and Labor Congress. "On motion received and endorsed"

Also a similar resolution submitted by Vice Pres. Fordyoe demanding that the Padlock Law be strukk from the statutes of Quebec and requesting the Federal Govt. to declare the Act ultra vires. "On motion endorsed by the Council and referred back to the Bricklayers for them to forward to Congress."

(4) Bellingham Central Labor Council, inviting delegates to attend their Labor Day picnic at Whatcom Falls Park. "On motion received with appreciation and delegates requested to note and any who can attend on the 5th are requested to register their names at the Council office."

(5) Director Vancouver Council Social Agencies asking for a meeting of either with the Executive or the Council to discuss the questions
of relationship between organized Social work and Organized Labor. "On
motion received and Mr. Davidson to be invited to address the next meeting for 10 mimutes."

(6) B.C.Coast Dist. Council I.W.A., dealing with the sentences given to 14 strikers at Blubber Bay and stating that some convicted were not in the vicinity at the time of the trouble and were afterwards pointed out to the Police by the Company officials. Request the Council to protest to the Attorney General the manner in which the trials had been held and to urge for the granting of a retrial. "On motion received and request complied with."

(7) Viotoria & Dist. Trades Council minutes of their meeting held on Aug. 3rd. "On motion received with appreciation and filed for reference."

(8) Vancouver Housing Assoc. requesting that a representative be sent to their Housing Committee. "On motion received and referred to the Building Trades Council."

(9) Copy of wire forwarded by the Secty. to the convention of the Hotel & Rest. Empl. in convention in San Francisco, extending fraternal greetings and good wishes from this Council. "On motion received & action of Secty in sending come and read "

of Secty. in sending same endorsed."

(10) A.T.Berg, member Seattle Local Typographical "202, relative to putting on a Union Label Guide. "It was moved by delegate Holland that this Council endorse the issuing of a Union Label Guide as requested in Mr. A.T.Berg's letter to Pres. Jamieson. The Label Guide to contain a comprehensive list of Union Label goods, Union made goods and firms and stores that are fair to organized labor. The Guide must not contain advertisements from Unfair or objectionable firms and is to be published without any cost whatsoever to the Trades and Labor Council and further that 10% of the net revenue be paid into the treasury of the Council; the work to start as soon as practicable, completed with dispatch and distributed free to the delegates to this Council and to the affiliated membership. "On motion endorsed."

The Chairman announced the following delegates appointed to the Legislative Committee to act with Delegate E.H.Morrison elected Chairman: Bengough, Showler, Neelands, Pritchard, Rankin, Ed. Smith, R. MacAulay, Couper and Astbury. "It was moved, seconded and carried that the report of the Executive as amended be adopted."

REPORTS OF OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES: -- Secretary reported that only 29 Unions had taken a ballot of their membership and the returns were 1482 in favor of upholding the decision of the Executive Board and 182 opposed. Secty. further reported a number of communications received

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from different organizations, some protesting the action of the Executive Board and stating that they for that reason were not taking a ballot and others stating that they were not taking a ballot as they thought it unnecessary and were in favor of the action of the Executive Board. On motion report received.

Organization Committee-Del. C. Stewart reported: The organizing Committee of the Trades and Labor Council is not satisfied with the progress being made in recruiting new members to our Unions. Organizational work has been done in a very spasmodic manner; instead of the organizing committee being the driving force in a continuous organizing campaign we have been satisfied to wait until we heard of a group of workers desirous of joining a Union, then we go and offer our assistance.

The growth of Company Unionism in Vancouver and throughout the province has brought forcibly home to us the necessity of a continuous organizational and Trade Union educational campaign being conducted by the Trades and Labor Council.

We therefore recommend for your approval as the first steps to or-

ganize every unorganized worker in this District:

(1) that a compiled list of all industrial establishments in this district covered by the Vancouver, New Westminster Trades and Labor Council, be supplied to the Organizing Committee, including the number of employees and any other information that would be

valuable to this Committee.
(2) An organizing campaign of the dimensions proposed by the Organizing Committee will require the assistance and cooperation of the whole Trade Union Movement. We therefore recommend that regular monthly meetings be held by the Committee with delegates appointed or elected from all Local Unions who are willing to assist the Committee in the work of making Vancouver a 100% Union town and that all Local Unions affiliated to the Van. New West. Trades and Labor Council be written to informing them of the organizational plans of this Council, petitioning all Locals to appaint or elect delegates to assist the organizing Committee as proposed and send the names and addresses to the Secretary of the Trades and Labor Council or the chairman of the Organization Committee. "On motion received and endorsed."

The Committee set up to consider the Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act submitted a report and members are requested to note that these suggested amendments together with the sections of the Act referred to are to be published in full in the next issue of the Labor Statesman. *On motion report received and organizations to be given the opportunity to consider before the report is dealt with at the first Council meeting in October.

Delegate Showler reported re the bail bond question that he had received a copy of the report on the question from the City and the claim is made that the \$5.00 fee was charged for the cases which were referred to the County Court. Also that the matter is still being investigated.

REPORTS OF UNIONS: -- Stage Empl. 118, del. Pearson reported they are having trouble with the Exhibition Board who have given a contract to a Non Union man for the erection and operation of a stage.

Jam. Vegetable Canners, del. Lee reported they had a request to meet the Minimum Wage Board and that the Canning companies stated they had no intention of canning tomatoes unless prices to growers and wages to the cannery workers were reduced and that such action on the part of the employers is breaking down their conditions.

NEW BUSINESS: The question of the Stage Employees Union and the Exhibition Board was on motion referred to the Grievance Committee.

Del. Fordyce introduced the question of City Manager and that the City Manager committee had submitted a list of six thousand names of citizens in favor of the City Manager plan. That these names were being checked by the City and a special meeting of the City Council would then be held to consider the question. Delegate Fordyce was appointed to represent the Council when such a meeting takes place.

President called attention to an item in the press dealing with the proposal of the City to set up a Committee to investigate the City not invited. On motion, Secretary to ask why this Council was

Delegate Holland introduced the question of parking meters and moved that this Council go on record as being opposed to their introduction. Following considerable discussion in which the Taxi Drivers and Teamsters stated that they were opposed to the motion and moved in vote being taken on the amendment, 31 voted for and 40 against. The motion was then put and carried.

It was moved, seconded and carried that this Council endorse the statements of Alderman DeGraves made in the City Council, in which he stated that City contracts should set out the compulsory payment of "Union" wages instead of the word "Fair" wages as now contained.

It was moved by Del. W. Stewart, seconded and carried that we extend an invitation to a representative from the Civil Liberties Union to address the Council for 10 minutes at the next regular meeting.

Meeting adjourned at 10:35 p.m.

Executive reported that Vice Pres. Fordyce was attending a City Council Committee meeting this evening to present a brief on behalf of the Council opposing the City Manager Plan, and recommended that the correspondence dealing with this question be laid over until the report next meeting. "On motion endorsed."

(1) Milk Drivers & Dairy Empl. enclosing a resolution requesting the Provincial Minister of Agriculture to appoint a representative of Organized Labor on the "Marketing Board" to product the interests of the consumers and others affected. "On motion received and endorsed."

(2) Ladies' Garment Workers 276 bringing the attention of delegates and members to the Sweet Sixteen Ltd., 137 W. Hastings St., retail store in this city where ladies coats, suits and other garments can be purchased carrying the Union Label. These goods are produced by Union workers in Vancouver. "On motion received and delegates requested to note and to report same to their Local Union!

(3) Union Label League, Montreal, asking the Council to write the John B. Stetson Co. Brookville, Ont., to place the Union Label of the Hatters Int. on their products. "On motion received and endorsed."

(10) Brick and Clay Wkrs. 136, notifying that they unanimously endorsed the stand taken by this Council on the question of Health Insurance. "On motion received and noted."

(11) Hollyburn Pacific and Vancouver Ski Clubs requesting the support of the Council in getting the whole of Hollyburn Ridge taken over as a Metropolitan Park area with the idea of developing a skining grounds. "On motion received and endorsed."

(12) Dr. A.F. Barton, Pres. Vancouver Federated Ratepayers Assoc. requesting the privilege of addressing the Council for a few minutes. On motion received and Dr. Barton to be given ten minutes at the

next meeting."

(13) Musicians Union #145 requesting that the Good Eats Cafe Pender St. West be placed on the non patronage list as they are employing Non Union Musicians. Executive recommended communication be received and referred to the Grievance Comm. for investigation and report. Following discussion a show-of-hands vote was taken, 33 voting in favor of referring to the Grievance Committee and 50 were opposed.

It was then moved, seconded and carried that this communication be referred back to the Musicians Union to be taken up with the Hotel

and Restaurant Empl. Local 28."

(14) Copy of wire sent to the Liberal convention at Kamloops favoring the construction of the Alaska Highway as it would open up territory now undeveloped and would provide needed employment in construction and by the establishment of new industries. "On motion received and action of the Secretary in sending wire endorsed."

(15) Int. Glove Workers Union asking the support of every Trade Unionist in its campaign requesting the Union Label on gloves. "On

motion received and noted."

(16) United Mine Workers 7355, Nanaimo and B.C. Coast District Council, I.W.A., dealing with the Blubber Bay strikers requesting financial and moral support. "On motion received and the Council to reaffirm its previous action whereby they recommend that this strike

is worthy of support.

"On motion communication received and this Council endorsed the following resolution as passed by the Niagara Convention of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada and a wire to be sent notifying the Premier of our action."

WHEREAS, we are meeting with the black clouds of war overhanging Europe and threatening to engulf the world, devastating cities and towns, raining bombs and slaughtering non-combatants, women and children, such as is now happening in Spain and China. The daily occurrence of which is already so common that the conscience of mankind has almost become blunted; and whereas, no policy has yet been announced on behalf of our Government, pledging support for action against

aggressor nations.

THEREFORE, be it resolved, that this Congress while reiterating its firm belief in collective action through the League of Nations as the most effective means of maintaining world peace, nevertheless recognizes the need to render help at this hour to those democratic countries whose independence and integrity is now being challenged; and, be it further resolved, that our Government be urged to cooperate with other peace loving countries of the world in whatever steps are deemed essential to destroy the reign of terror being imposed by Nazi and Fascist dictators and thus remove this menace of international lawlessness and once more bring peace to mankind; and be it further resolved, that we call upon the Prime Minister, Right Hon. Wm. Lyon McKenzie King to immediately convene Parliament in order to make known the policy of Canada to its people and to the world.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES:--Boycott Committee, delegate Shearer reported that the Committee were going to speed up their activities during the winter months and requested affiliated Unions to get behind their activities.

REPORTS OF UNIONS: -- Bakers 468 -- Delegate Humphreys reported that they had resigned their agreements with Hastings Bakery; Mother Hubbard Bakery; Canadian Bakeries; McGavin's Limited; Cowan Dodson; Robertsons Bakery Ltd and Campbell Bakery.

Hotel & Rest. Empl. 28-del. Gateman reported the Province Cafe, Main St. had been signed up and thanked delegates Griffin and Stewart and members of Division 101 for assistance rednered. Also reported they are holding a dance on October 6th in the Palomar Ballroom and that refreshments would be provided.

Typographical 226--delegate Holland reported that following negotiations with the Job printing shops they have signed up on the basis of a 40 hour week at \$1.00 per hour which is 8 and 4 cent increase

to a number of the employees.

Railway Carmen 58-Delegate Warde reported more men employed as a result of the increased wheat shipments.

Carpenters 452-del. Wilson reported they have signed up with the Contractor's an agreement for 90¢ per hour. Also that the 75¢ minimum

set up by the Government was not the Union scale.

B.C. Coast District Council—delegate Lundgren reported on the Blubber Bay situation and that the Attorney General had been agreeable to an investigation into Police interference but that the Premier had overruled it.

NEW BUSINESS: -- Del. Humphreys moved that the question of the Rolling Pin Bakery be referred to the Grievance Committee with Power to Act. "Garried."

QUESTION BY MEMBERS: --Question was asked as to why Local 28 was not permitted to state its case re Good Eats Cafe. President Jamieson replied.

tion and Canada's position. "On motion received and filed."
(2) B.C.Coast District Council, I.W.A. notifying that they are calling a defense meeting Friday, Oct. 7th at 130 W. Hastings St. and asking delegates to attend. Also a resolution from the Pile Drivers Local 2404 requesting an investigation by the Provincial Govt. into the whole question of the Blubber Bay strike, the actions of the Company and Provincial Police. "On motion received, the subject matter endorsed and referred to the Executive to take up with the Provincial

(3) Housewives' League, British Columbia, requesting the privilege of sending a speaker to the Council to explain Bill 89. "On motion received and a speaker invited to address the next meeting."

(4) B.C. Federation on Unemployment setting out that they are not a dual organization to this Council. That they have not accepted affiliation from Unions affiliated with the Canadian Federation of Labour and that they are not associated with any political party. That they have no connection with the C.C.F. Economic Conference. "On motion received and noted."

Executive reported having reviewed the question of Parking Meters in this city and particularly the opinions of such organizations as Teamsters and Taxi Drivers and others who constantly use the City streets and recommended that the resolution as passed at the previous meeting condemning Parking Meters be rescinded and further consideration given to the question.

Following discussion on this question later in the evening, it was moved, seconded and carried that this matter be laid over to be

brought up at the next meeting.

Dr. Davidson, Executive Director Vancouver Welfare Federation addressed the Council on the work of the Welfare Federation and went into many details of their activities. Following the address it was moved, seconded and carried that a committee of five be appointed by the Executive to investigate and report back to the Council.

Dr. Barton, President Federated Ratepayers Assoc. addressed the Council on the necessity of cleaning up the False Creek area where a deplorable condition of open sewers exists, the idea being to put in city park and playgrounds. "On motion it was decided that we reiterate our stand on the question of cleaning up False Creek.

Mr. L.O. Thomas of the Vancouver Symphony Society addressed the Council on the work of the Symphony Society. That they are giving six concerts in the Orpheum Theatre, the price of admission being 25 cents to \$200. He pointed out that now the prices have been reduced that people should take advantage of the opportunity offered. The address was received with interest and delegates requested to note.

B.C.Coast Dist. Council. del. Lundgren reported that 23 had been arrested. That 7 had been sentenced, one to six months who was not even there at the time of the trouble in Blubber Bay. Eight are in jail as they are unable to find bail. Also reported on Provincial policeman charged with assault.

Retail Clerks 279, Del. Maxwell reported that they had signed agreements with Safeway, Piggly Wiggly and Superior Stores. That they had visited five organizing meetings and were continuing their

<u>Civic Employees 25</u>—Delegate Ashton reported that there is a proposal to change the Superanuation Act as affecting Civic Employees and to raise the voluntary and compulsory qualifying ages.

Milksalesmen 464—Delegate Showler reported that the Empress Dairy is still on the Non Patronage list. Also reported that at their last meeting they had passed a resolution against the sale of raw milk unless the dairy is inspected daily by the City. Also that they are in favor of the Better Business Bureau.

Hospital Employees -- (Civic Empl. 28.) delegate reported that the Board of Directors of the Vancouver General Hospital had agreed to pay the award as recommended by the Arbitration Board.

Retail Clerks 279-Delegate Maxwell reported that the stores controlled by Ray Esslinger have been put into a Company Union. These stores sell groceries, meats, clothing, etc. and include Superior Meat Market, Ideal market, Rainier market, Grand Union Market, Cash and Carry, B.C. Public Market.

Railway Carmen 58-Delegate Shearer reported that the C.P.R. are laying off 30 thousand employees for 3 weeks and that such action is a violation of their Agreement.

Railway Carmen 280-Delegate Jackson reported the C.N.R. are also contemplating a lay off like the C.P.R.

Inland Boatmens' Union-delegate Driscoll reported that they have "Company" Unions to contend with in this Port.

Butchers Local #94 Delegate Hughes reported that the Swift Company are a little better in their attitude towards Organized Labor than the other Packing plants in view of the position of the Burns Company and the fact that the Canada Packers have a "Company" Union, whereas the Swift Company do recognize a shop committee of Butchers Local 94.

(10) Montreal Stereotypers & Electrotypers reporting on the unfair attitude of the Herald Publishing Co. of Montreal which company is making all mats sent out by the Dominion news bureau of Montreal. "On motion received and referred to the Allied Printing Trades Council"

Moved, seconded and carried that the report of the Executive as a whole be adopted.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES: -- Grievance Committee, Delegate Hughes reported they had held meetings to consider the question of the Esslinger stores and the request of the Hotel & Restaurant Employees to put the Arctic Club on the "We Do Not Patronize" list and reported progress on both

questions. "On motion report received."

Special Committee to investigate publication "Labour Truth" President Jamieson reported having appointed delegates Showler, Arbuckle and Maxwell. Delegate Showler reported they had made a thorough investigation of the publication, the Committee was surprised at some of the people who were advertising in it as it was not in the strict sense of the word a Labor paper. While it was endorsed apparently by the Shipping Federation Company Unions it was pointed out very strongly that the paper was not by any means an authority on Labor questions but was merely the voice of Unions that are owned and controlled by the Shipping Federation.

Committee recommended that this Council insert in the "Personal" columns of the daily Province and Sun, twice a month, an advert. stating that the "Labor Statesman" is the only official organ of this Council. Following further consideration the report of the Committee

was received and endorsed.

Press Committee -- Delegate Holland reported that the law suit brought against the Statesman had resulted in the case against the Press Committee being dismissed but that the one bringing suit had been awarded damages against the Editor and at the present time the actual amounts involved were not as yet stated. "On motion report received as progress."

Organizing Committee -- Delegate Chas. Stewart reported they had a meeting last Wednesday evening and had considered the questions of the Boot and Shoe Workers Union now in a very poor condition on account of the opposition received from London Shoe Renew; Woodward Store; Hudson Bay and Spencers. Recommended that the Executive interview Woodwards Store pointing out the discrimination.

That the Organizing Committee had a further meeting arranged for the 7th of December. "On motion report received and the recommendation

REPORTS OF UNIONS: -- Civic Employees 28, Delegate Scribbins reported that last Thursday they had met to celebrate the victory of the Hospital Employees in securing improved wages and conditions as a result of the Arbitration Board which had met on the case and to pay tribute to Secretary Bengough for the assistance he had given to the organization

Machinists 692, delegate Arbuckle reported that they had signed up a closed shop agreement covering Machinists Fitters, Specialists and Helpers with the Burrard Dry Dock and hoped to report on more firms be-

ing signed up in the near future.

Bakers, delegate Humphreys reported that they had renewed their Nanaimo agreement with a five cent increase of wages. Also that they had a Board and had accepted the majority award but that the Company had not. As a result a strike had been called Friday and they were now picketting the Woman's Bakery and stores. That the men desire a signed Agreement, and would not go back until same was secured. It was also reported that they are in need of financial assistance.

Milkdrivers 464, delegate Showler reported they had signed up the Empress Dairy. Also thanked the Secretary of the Upholsterers Union for the assistance he had rendered to their Local. Further reported that the Crystal Dairy and the Jersey Farms Dairy are still on the "We Do Not Patronize" list. Also that they are holding a Dance on Wednesday, December 7th in the Moose Hall and invited delegates to attend. Refreshments will be served by members of Local 28.

NEW BUSINESS: -- Moved, seconded and carried that the Empress Dairy be taken off the "We Do Not Patronize" list.

Delegate Arbuckle, Machinists 692 introduced the question of the six month sentence which had been passed recently on Mrs. Rose who had been convicted of manslaughter arising out of a street accident. He pointed out that one of her sons is a member of the Machinists' Union and that Mrs. Rose had already suffered a great deal. It was moved, seconded and carried that this Council send a letter to the Minister of Justice asking for clemency in this case.

Delegate Humphreys moved that the question of placing the Woman's Bakery on the "We Do Not Patronize" list be referred to the Grievance Committee with Power to act. The question of the Montreal Bakery was reintroduced by Delegate Showler and a previous motion to refer to the Grievance Committee to be rescinded. "On motion carried."

Moved, seconded and carried that the question of placing the Montreal Bakery on the "We Do Not Patronize" list be referred to the Grievance Committee with power to act.

Delegate C. Stewart introduced the following resolution: That this Trades and Labor Council instruct its secretary to write to the German Consul in Vancouver protesting the persecution of the Jewish people and that a resolution be sent to Prime Minister MacKenzie King petitioning the Canadian Government to protest against the pogroms and request that all relations to broken off with a country that has reverted to barbarism and that we ask all locals to take similar action. "On motion carried."

Meeting adjourned at 9:50 p.m.

Secretary reported that the provincial Executive of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada had interviewed the Provincial Cabinet

and secured from them an assurance that Section 5 of the Industrial Disputes investigation Act would be opened and a change made recognizing the officers of a Union as the bargaining Agency where the majority of the employees were members of the Union and that since receiving that assurance the Minister of Labour has notified us that the change cannot be made and the Act cannot be opened. Then bater has again notified us that there is a possibility of the Act being opened and stating that they are requesting interested parties to appear before the Cabinet.

Secretary further pointed out that the suggestions now made for a change by the Minister of Labour were a complete abrogation of the Agreement made with the Cabinet in Victoria last week.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the action of the Provincial Executive and the Secretary be endorsed and that the Secretary again go to Victoria and state the case on behalf of the Council. The Council further went on record as deploring the action of the Provincial Government for the manner in which they had broken the Agreement made with the Provincial Executive.

The question of the Railroad Running Trades cooperating with the Provincial Executive of the Congress was discussed and the Secty pointed out that it was the desire of the provincial Executive to cooperate at all times.

Moved, seconded and carried that the report of the Executive as a whole be adopted.

Under a special order of business it was moved, seconded and carried unanimously that the Secretary write to Labor Headquarters Limited expressing appreciation to them for the splendid way in which the hall in which the Council meetings are held had been renovated."

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES: --

Grievance Committee, delegate Hughes reported they had considered the question of placing the Woman's Bakery on the "We Do Not Patronize" list and that under present conditions such action could not be taken. Recommended that a meeting be arranged with the Executive of the Bakers and Bakery Salesmen and this Council to consider the whole question. "On motion report accepted and recommendation endorsed."

Engineers 963, delegate reported that under the new suggested superannuation Act whereby those coming under the superannuation in the future would have to be below the age of thirty years would work a hardship on engineers who have to hold a certificate of competency which ofttimes cannot be secured by one of thirty years and requested that the same be taken up.

Retail Clerks 279, delegate Maxwell reported progress in organizing in some of the larger stores and requested delegates, members and friends to give a word of encouragement to the clerks and

a good word for the Union, when making purchases.

Teamsters Local 31, delegate Atkinson reported they were endea woring to organize the drivers who make the delivery of beer from the liquor stores. That they were not meeting with success as this contract had been let to a private company and requested that member when having deliveries made request that the beer be delivered by Union drivers.

Sheet Metal Workers 250, Delegate Macpherson reported they had endorsed the resolution protesting the persecution of the Jews by Nazi Germany and had also endorsed the resolution against any infringement of the Congress constitution. Further reported with regret that their International President had recently died in

Washington, D. C.

Upholsterers Delegate reported they now have signed agreements with the Wholesalers in the industry and a number of the retail shops. Also desire to express their thanks to the Council Secretary for assistance rendered and further reported that they had organized the frame makers and that in other agreements signed there had been considerable wage increases, particularly in the lower brackets.

Bakers 468, delegate Humphreys thanked the Secretary of the Council for assistance rendered in signing up the Montreal Bakery who had now signed up both with the Bakers and Bakery Salesmen.

Also reported on the strike at the Woman's Bakery and pointed out that the Woman's Bakery have some 110 agencies and asked delegates and members to patronize stores which are handling Union

bread and cakes.

Milksalesmen 464, Delegate Showler reported that jointly with the other Teamsters locals they are holding a turkev dance with a Union orchestra and refreshments served by members of Local 28. in the Moose Hall on the 7th instant. Also reported that the soft drink Pepsi-Cola is being delivered by Non Union drivers.

Engineers 115, delegate Flinn reported they had endorsed the resolution protesting infringement of the Trades & Labor Congress jurisdiction. Also reported that engineers union was making a special drive on Engineers in Apartment houses. Also thanked the

Beverage Dispensers for assistance rendered.

Civic Employees 28, delegate reported they had endorsed the resolution protesting the persecution of the Jews by Nazi Germany and had endorsed the resolution protesting interference with the Trades and Labor Congress. Also had donated \$25.00 to the Blubber Bay strikers.

Shipyard Laborers delegate Leary reported they had endorsed the resolution protesting persecution of Jews and had endorsed the

Port Arhur resolution.

Meatcutters, delegate Douglas reported their Local had endorsed the resolution condemning the persecution of the Jews and further reported that the meat at the Winter Fair had been bought by the firms in the City and sent to Burns & Co. to be slaughtered. Also reported on companies that were advertising Bakeasy and Campfire bacon which are Burns products. Requested the Trades & Labor Council to write these companies deploring such advertisements.

Typographical Union, delegate Holland reported that at their last meeting they had deplored the action of this Council in passing the resolution protesting the interference with the Trades and Labor Congress prior to the meeting being held with the two

Executives.

Salmon Purse Seiners, delegate Miller reported they had endorsed the resolution condemning persecution of the Jews and had endorsed the resolution sent out by the Port Arthur Trades Council. Also reported that the Pacific Coast Fishermen had been endeavoring to amalgamate with the B.C. Fishermen's Protective Assocl which organization had voted not to affiliate by a small majority.

NEW BUSINESS: -- Engineers Local 963 introduced a resolution requesting that the clause in the proposed Superannuation Act prohibiting men over 30 from participating in the benefits be deleted.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the matter be referred to the Provincial Executive with power to act.

Discussion arose regarding Union firms advertising unfair goods and delegate Maxwell stated that the same was embarassing to the Retail Clerks and that the Safeway people had stated they would not further advertise Bakeasy in their advertisements.

Barbers 120, delegate Herrett reported they had recently signed for a Shop card in the barber shop on Fraser between 45th and 46th and at 4062 East Hastings Street.

Painters 138, Del. Smith reported that at this time of year many members are idle and would ask members who are having decorating work done in their homes to employ members of Local 138. Also that the School Board as usual were employing Union men.
